That Jack Sharkey did not put an end to it at Yankee stadium is the fault of no one but Sharkey himself.

Dempsey's punch no longer is anything to be feared, but his heart is like a lion's.

Jack only wants to fight once more, anyhow. He wants to make one more gesture across the fistic stage and to collect one more half million. And so there is no reason why he should spoil things by winning a title with which he would have to retire.

Heavyweight titles belong to Tex Rickard, and are just about the most valuable things in captivity. But they have to be taken out and put on exhibition once a year to thrive and make more millions for their owner.

And yet, just because he is Jack Dempsey and that kind of a fellow, the man from Manassa will go into the ring at Chicago bent upon annihilating the champion. It will be no repetition of the rainy Sesquehanna fiasco.
