CHICAGO, July 30.—(AP)—"Big Bill" Tilden and his protegee, "Sandy" Welser of Philadelphia avenged their defeat a week ago in the national clay-courts championship at Detroit by defeating their counterparts in straight sets today to capture the U.S. doubles title. Tilden and his pupil beat John Hennessy of Indianapolis and Luke Williams of Philadelphia, 6-2, 6-0, 6-1.
 The victory was Tilden's almost single-handed. His terrific speed and deadly accuracy made Hennessy and Williams commit errors repeatedly. He covered the entire court during most of the match.

Public Asked for Attitude on Bout

CHICAGO, July 30.—(AP)—Fights talk swung from Tex Rickard and Chicago officials to public opinion today. All the principals in the heavyweight conference except Rickard were out of town on week-end outings and the fight columns of the papers were filled with responses to the appeal of the South Park board for exhibition of public opinion. President Edward J. Kelly of the Park board, which controls the stadium, said the board's action over the fight question would be determined by the letters from the citizens.
 Rickard himself enjoyed a day of rest trying to better his golf score of 45 on the first nine holes on Bob's link.
 "I haven't any more conferences scheduled until Monday," he said, "when we will learn whether the Park board will let us have the stadium. I don't see any reason why they shouldn't let us have the field."
 Rickard still holds to his assertion that he has made New York no promises for the Dempsey-Tunney fight and that Chicago has much the best chance of seeing it.

Organized opposition to the match seemed to be dwindling over the week-end, with the announcement of Attorney J. Kentner Elliott that he would withdraw his petition for an injunction against holding the bout in Soldiers Field.

YOUTH IS WINNING IN TENNIS TILTS

NEW YORK, July 30.—(AP)—John Doe's devastating serve had a day off but in its place was a sharpshooting placement game that today carried him to victory over the tenth best player in the country, Dr. George King of New York, in the semi-finals of the Metropolitan turf court tennis championship.
 The 18-year-old Californian triumphed at 5-7, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2, carried him to the final round and striking distance of his third straight title in his sensational invasion of the east.
