er on the motion for new trial has been preceded by a denial by Justice George A. Sanderson of the Massachusetts supreme court, of the defense petition for a writ of habeas corpus. Justice Sanderson also had denied a writ of error.

**Petition Respects.** It was indicated, however, that his decision would be withheld pending the outcome of the court decision.

Attorney Arthur D. Hill, new chief defense counsel, announced at the conclusion of the hearing at Dedham that he would be back to the state supreme court with an appeal from Judge Thayer's ruling that he had no jurisdiction in connection with the new trial motion.

**Judge Defends Self.** Judge Thayer, who had borne in silence for the past several years accusations of unjusticial conduct in regard to the case, defended himself in a speech from the bench during the hearing.

"Every defendant, whatever his race, whether native or foreign-born, should have a fair trial," he said. "With regard to alleged prejudice, I am ready to be judged by the record and by what I have said. Is there any authority as to the true test of what constitutes prejudice on the part of a judge? If there were prejudice, it would show in the records.

"I have been upheld by the state supreme court and by the governor. They found no abuse of discretion or prejudice in the records."

**Files Affidavit.** At the opening session, Hill filed an affidavit signed by one Candido Divonna, who claimed to have witnessed the South Braintree murder for which Sacco and Vanzetti are sentenced to die.

The affidavit said that Divonna told the police of South Braintree that he had witnessed the crime and that Sacco and Vanzetti were not the slayers. He claimed the police ignored his testimony.

### Princess Taken with Manliness

NEW ALBANY, Ind., Aug. 8.

(AP)—Newland Knight, of New Albany, former cadet at Culver military academy, "cannot see that there was much chivalry" to his playing "knight errant" to Princess Beana of Romania when she fainted at Rossville, Ind., on her tour of the United States, with her mother, Queen Marie, last winter.

Knight's act of succoring the princess was related by Queen Marie in dispatches from Roumania. The queen said the princess was "quite overcome by the manliness, tender care and chivalry which was shown by the young student."

"We administered aid any one would give a person who had fainted," Knight said. "All that I did was to rub her feet and ankles. When she regained consciousness she expressed surprise that she had fainted and wondered why she had done so."

"Nothing romantic ever came of it. About three weeks later I received a picture of the princess and a typewritten letter signed by her thanking me for my attentions. I did not reply to the letter, and I do not believe I had any romantic ideas about the incident."

The incident occurred while the princess, with Knight, Colonel Calvin P. Chambers of Culver, Miss Marr, the princess' English tutor, and the chauffeur were enroute from Chicago to Indianapolis. A blinding snow was falling, and the princess, who was driving, crashed into a truck at Grant Park, Ill.
