Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23. (AP) Although dairy exchange quotations for butter and eggs were not advanced for today the market tone for both is very firm with local receipts for top grades well below demand. Storage holdings were decreased yesterday by 172 cases of eggs and 679 pounds of butter.

Private and cooperative egg dealers are still in disagreement over grading and prices for wholesale extras. Prices ranging from one to three cents are quoted to retailers.

A movement to revise the grade specifications for extras to a basis more agreeable to all jobbers is being handled through a special committee which expected to report recommendations today.

Fresh fruits and vegetables moved in a normal manner in wholesale trading this morning. Prices generally unchanged and supplies were continued plentiful in most reasonable lines.

Elberta peaches are becoming a little scarce and are expected to be ended soon. Their place in the trade is being taken by new peaches of the Level variety to sell a little cheaper than the Elbertas at from 90 cents to \$1 per box.

There is little movement in the potato trade with little local digging reported.

First new crop local onions are expected to start into the local market in earnest the first of next week for which advance quotations estimate a range of from \$1 to \$1.10 to the growers.

Country dressed meats were firm at unchanged prices this morning with supplies of top staff barely sufficient for the trade.

Poultry demand is steady at firm prices. Heavies still sell to the trade at from 22 to 23 cents.

Wheat

CHICAGO, Aug. 23. (AP)—Opening 1/4 to 1/8 higher, wheat later receded to below yesterday's finish. Commission houses bought September and December corn at the start on unfavorable weather, the marketing starting 1/4 to 1/8 up and subsequently suffering a slight set back. Oats sympathized with wheat and corn. Provisions were easy.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23. (AP)—Mixed price movement came into the stock market for a while today following an early resumption of the upward trend in which about 30 stocks, including some of the dividend-paying railroads, reached their best prices of the year. For a time various stocks in different groups ad-

vanced and declined simultaneously until the weight of heavy offerings in the oil section ultimately bore down on the remainder of the list.

Pan American "B" went down 4 1/2 points and losses of 2 to 2 1/2 points were sustained by Houston Oil, Atlantic Refining and General Asphalt.

Active trading in General Motors, a four-point drop in Pierce Arrow Pfd. and losses of three points in Woolworth and Remington Rand also served to disconcert the bullish element for a time, but in the early afternoon a number of specialties moved up to new peak prices.

The closing was steady. Supporting orders brought a 5 to 6 point rally in Houston Oil and Yellow Truck Pfd., while other earlier weak industrials and specialties generally began to show recuperative powers, as United States Steel drew up to the 140 level in the last hour. Total sales approximated 1,900,000 shares.
