Read These Final Instructions carefully.

1. All remittances mailed from now on should be mailed special delivery to insure their reaching us in time. If you live outside of Klamath Falls, and intend to mail subscriptions, take the precaution to find out what time your postoffice closes.
2. You are allowed the privilege of mailing your subscriptions up to Saturday, August 27, 9 p. m. This gives you the opportunity to work up to the last minute. In sending your subscriptions by mail, have them in your postoffice before Saturday, August 27, 9 p. m.
3. All remittances should be carefully addressed to the Campaign Department, The Klamath News and Evening Herald, Klamath Falls, Ore. This will insure absolute accuracy and will prevent any letters from going astray. Be sure and use Special Delivery stamp on all mail.
4. Examine your vote ballots carefully and see that the correct number of votes have been issued on same. Pay particular attention to omissions and errors. If there are any corrections to be made, notify the Campaign Manager in person or in writing, and return the ballots for proper correction. The campaign department will not be responsible for clerical errors unless notification is given, whereupon correction will be made.
5. Under no condition will votes be transferred from one candidate to another. This is an absolute rule and will be strictly enforced.
6. Every subscription turned in will be verified and no prizes will be awarded until this is done. All votes secured on old subscriptions turned in as new will be cancelled. "Switching" will only result in regret and disappointment. Be sure that your subscriptions are marked correctly.
7. Second payments must be marked as such on the remittance sheet. Also put down the amount of the first payment so that proper votes may be given.
8. All remittances sent into the campaign office after Wednesday, August 24, should be either postal money orders, express money orders, certified checks, or drafts.
