NOTICE INVITING BIDS FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 73

Pursuant to ordinance No. 924, of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said City at his office in the City Hall, up to and including Monday, the 5th day of September, 1927, at 8 o'clock P. M., for making the proposed improvement of Alley in Block 49, Nichols Addition between Ninth and Eleventh Streets.

Said improvement to consist of paving said portion of said alley with Type "A" Wagonite-Bitullithic pavement, with 5" base, at an estimated cost of \$2,224.28; or, Type "A" Asphaltic Concrete pavement with 5" base at an estimated cost of \$2,129.16; or, Cement Concrete pavement 7" thick or Vibrolithic pavement 7" thick at an estimated cost of \$2,289.28.

The above improvement to consist of grading to the proper subgrade, constructing an appropriate hard surface pavement for the entire width of the alley (14 feet) by placing sewer connections where needed, and by performing all other work required to make a complete improvement, including alley stubs for the adjacent sidewalk spaces on Eleventh and Ninth Streets.

Said improvement will be let in one contract and bids will be received for each kind of pavement specified above, and will be opened for consideration by the Common Council on the said 5th day of September, 1927, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. Bidders will be required to submit bids on blanks prepared by the City Engineer, and bids will not be considered unless so submitted.

The successful bidder will be required to give a bond in a sum to be fixed by the Common Council for the faithful performance of the contract to be entered into for making said improvement. Each bid must be accompanied by a check certified by some responsible bank for five (5) per cent of the amount bid, as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the City for the making of such improvement within ten (10) days from the date of making such award.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, and to make such improvement on behalf of the City.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 26. (AP)—It is believed that when the state land board meets attorneys of sand and gravel concerns operating in the Columbia river here today that a compromise will be reached concerning compensation that should be paid the state for sand taken from the river during past years.

At a recent conference here the sand and gravel companies offered a flat payment of \$1,000 or \$500 to each of the two states, Oregon and Washington. The attorney general has held that the state of Oregon has a legal right to levy back to 1920 on a yardage basis, but it is indicated here that the state will not exercise the right in full. The conference will be in session in the afternoon.

Chief value in the visit, so far as Klamath is concerned, lies in the fact that the opportunity is unexcelled from the standpoint of acquainting Washington officials with the problems of the Klamath farmer, it was pointed out by those who are sponsoring the banquet, yesterday.

Bruce Dennis, local newspaper publisher, will be the principal speaker for Klamath, and his words will carry to the committee the importance of the successful Klamath project as a part of the government's nationwide reclamation system. C. A. Henderson, chairman of the Klamath land settlement committee, will officiate as chairman at the dinner, and will further acquaint the irrigation investigators with this vast farming section.

Public Invited

As the dinner is open to the public, and a cordial invitation has been extended to all who are interested in Klamath's agricultural future, reservations should be made early today at the local chamber of commerce, Lynn Sablin, secretary, declared yesterday.

Visit of the congressmen and a number of Portland leaders here, follows an extensive tour of western reclamation projects and proposed projects in the northwest. Last object of the committee's attention was the proposed Deschutes project, with which they were acquainted at a dinner in Bend Friday.

From here the men will probably visit Roseburg and Grants Pass, later going into California, and returning to Washington by the southern route, it was learned Friday.

Markets

PORTLAND, Aug. 26. (AP)—The local scarcity of receipts of top grade eggs shows some signs of loosening. The volume of receipts from the country was a little improved yesterday and dealers at the late afternoon session of the dairy exchange were ready to bid extra down 2c to 2 1/2 cents, the new exchange wholesale price today. Firsts are also down a cent to 30c. Other grades are unchanged.

The butter market continues on a firm tone locally with no changes in quotations for wholesale grades today. The local market situation for fresh fruits and vegetables was unchanged this morning with supplies ample and trade lagging in most seasonable lines. Tomatoes continue relatively cheap under influence of plentiful supplies of local and eastern Washington stuff. They were quoted at from 60 to 80 cents per box, wholesale.

Supplies of bartlett pears continue steady from California and sell at wholesale around \$3 per box, about 25c cheaper than last week's close.

Country dressed meats and poultry were quiet this morning. All lines of meats were firm at steady prices. Light hena were easy at 13c.
