### U. of W. Mentor Needs Backfield

SEATTLE, Aug. 31. (U. P.)—Although assured of the nucleus of a strong line with which to start the 1927 football season, Coach Enoch Bagshaw of the University of Washington, is faced with the problem of developing almost an entirely new backfield to work behind his forwards. And the backfield situation is causing "Baggy" quite a bit of worry as the opening of the coast conference season draws near.

The Husky mentor has two men to start with in whom he has great confidence. They are "Chuck" Carroll and Louis Tesreau, veterans of the last year's squad. "I believe I have the making of the two greatest backs in the conference," Bagshaw declares. But the question is what can be developed to back them up.

Stombaugh, a letterman, will be out again this year and with any improvement should make a good running mate for Carroll and Tesreau. From the super-variety team Bagshaw will recruit five men, all good prospects but lacking in experience. They are Flannigan, McCain, Prevost, Montgomery and Dalquest. Dalquest was forced out of last year's game because of a weak knee. Barring accidents, he is expected to make a wonderful showing this season. The coaches were well pleased with his work during the first part of the season when he was able to play.

These are two promising men coming from the freshmen squad, Thornton and Pulver.

The quarterback position is the big problem of the backfield. George Gattormsen, three year veteran, was last season through graduation. Johnny Geehan, letterman from last year's squad, appears to be the logical player to step into that position. Duffy, super-variety quarter last year, is another prospect. He should show much improvement after last year's play and should furnish Geehan much competition.

Lonny Butler, a hard fighter and a cool head under fire, will be watched by Bagshaw. Last year the coaches agreed that all Butler needed was a little more experience.
