

Vice Ring May Be Broken By Police

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8. (UP)—A gigantic white slave ring which used the middle west as a supply ground for Pacific coast vice dens was believed to have been uncovered by police tonight.

One man was under arrest, a city-wide search was extended for a second, and authorities were waiting the recovery of pretty Ruth Phillips, 26, of Denver, alleged victim of the ring.

From these three, police hoped to trace the complete operation of the organization.

First advice concerning the ring came in a mysterious telephone call early yesterday morning. Police were advised a girl was being held captive in a downtown hotel. The informer refused to give his name, but he urged authorities to act in haste.

When the raiding squad battered down the door of the hotel room, they found Miss Phillips in an exhausted and hysterical condition. She said for six days the proprietor of the hotel, Jeff Northway, 50, and the man who brought her from Denver, Walter Richards, had kept her prisoner, attempting to convert her to immoral practices.

During that time, she declared she had been kept constantly under the influence of liquor and drugs.

Miss Phillips said she was separated but not divorced from George H. Peters, of Denver. She met Richards there and he brought her to Los Angeles, promising to marry her as soon as she could get a divorce.

Health Officer Sends Out Rules

With the opening of school only a few days away, a bulletin has been issued by Frederick D. Strickler of the state board of health, warning against the spread of disease in the school room and suggesting for precautions which may prevent the outbreak of disease.

He suggests that before the opening of school a sample of drinking water should be sent to the state board of health laboratory for analysis, the cooperation of parents with the local health officer and family physician in isolating diseases.

If there is a suspicion that a childhood disease has been in the family during vacation time, the family physician or health officer should be consulted before the opening of school.

QUACK DOCTOR IS HELD AS PRISONER

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8. (UP)—Charged with poisoning a husband while he fed "love potions" to his wife, "Dr." D. Nelson Smith, alleged quack physician, Thursday was held over for superior court on a charge of poisoning, at the close of his preliminary hearing.

His bail was set at \$2500. According to testimony introduced, Smith prescribed pills containing Mercury and digitalis to P. R. Gonzalez, while he seduced Mrs. Gonzalez by administering "love potions."

Mexicans Not Skilled In Chicago Banditry, Fail in Holdup Attempt

CHICAGO, Sept. 8. (UP)—One of the most stupid attempts at banditry in Chicago, where bandits are supposed to know their profession, has failed, but the busy loop will long remember it.

Three Mexicans attempted to hold up a federal reserve bank armored car at the door of the federal building today, but didn't succeed in their venture because the car was shut as tight as a safe.

In a rage they left and ducked over to a taxi, demanding a ride. The chauffeur noticing that one carried a knife up his sleeve, refused to take them. They attempted to stab him.

Police were called and a blazing gun battle started at the height of the noon hour rush in the busiest section of the famous loop.

One Mexican was killed by a policeman's bullet, three innocent bystanders were wounded by stray shots, and J. J. Hacker, a mounted policeman, was stabbed in the thigh.

The other two would-be bandits escaped in the dense throng. Thousands witnessed the sensational running gun battle and thousands of others scurried to the shelter of stores and office buildings.

The gun battle might not have occurred had not officer Hacker, riding his horse, seen the Mexican flash his knife. Hacker jumped from the animal, calling on the three Mexicans to throw up their hands. Instead they fled across the street and entered the federal building.

A moment later they emerged shooting wildly. P. L. Pearce, a prohibition agent, V. E. McMahon, a department store employe and Nick Nikodem, a mail carrier were leaving the building at that time and were wounded.

Farmers Adopting California Plan

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8. (UP)—Farmers of the world are gradually adopting the cooperative marketing plan upon which California orange growers unwittingly stumbled in 1884. Aaron Sapiro, noted Chicago attorney, stated on a recent visit here.

"Forty-one states and many foreign nations have already adopted this state's plan of organized disposal of commodities without the insertion of the political element," he stated, "and others are preparing to follow."

Killer of Cop Is Facing Life Term

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8. (UP)—Frank Miller, 18, confessed killer of Policeman Albert Matthias of Arcadia, was found guilty of murder in the first degree after a jury deliberated the case for 5 1/2 hours today.

The verdict recommended that he be sentenced to life imprisonment. Ray Odell and William Mockford, companions of Miller at the time of the slaying, changed their pleas of not guilty to guilty to the murder charge.

All three will be sentenced on Monday to San Quentin for life. Matthias was fatally wounded July 19, when he approached the trio to question them concerning an automobile in which they were riding. It was a stolen machine.

POWER MAN FALLS DOWN STEEP BANK

Thomas W. Delzell, western division manager of the California-Oregon Power company, sustained slight cuts and bruises Thursday when he fell on the steep hillside near Alameda. Delzell rolled over several times before he managed to check his gyratory descent.

Delzell, in company with Glenn Ora Parker, division stock salesman, were enroute to Fort Klamath when a tire on their machine went flat. While fixing it, Delzell lost his footing and tumbled down the steep bank.

FIRE SEASON IS NEARING AN END

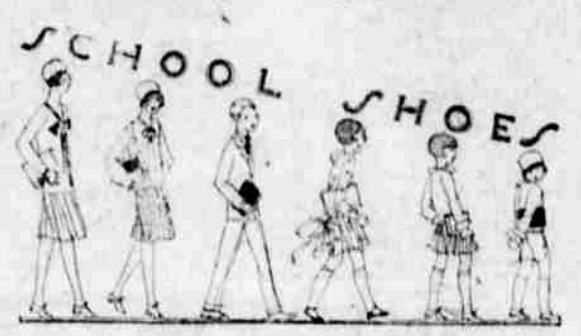
