British Plan Air Service On Ocean

LONDON, Sept. 12. (UP)—While long-distance airplane flights are being frowned upon as dangerous and impractical, the air ministry announced today that it is proceeding with plans for inter-division dirigible services, both mail and passenger, including a trans-Atlantic service.

Commissions have been sent to Canada and South Africa to select landing places. Dirigibles, built on the Zeppelin principle, now are being built to inaugurate in the service, probably during 1929.
