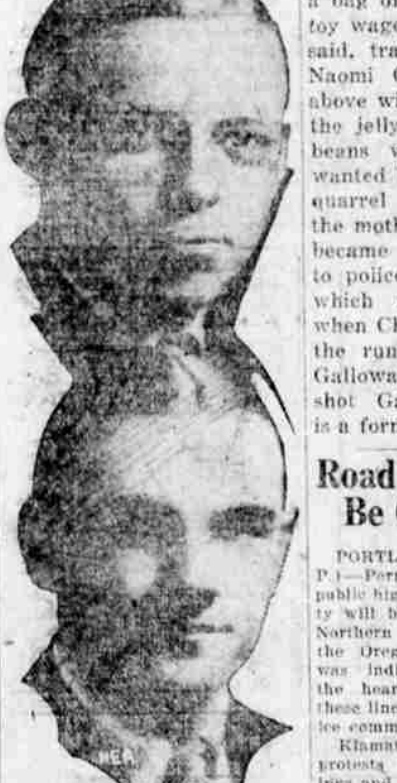
## TURKEY GROWERS TO TALK MARKETS

## Road Rights To Be Granted G. N.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 21. (A. P.)—Permission to cross several public highways in Klamath county will be granted to the Great Northern Railway company and the Oregon Trunk Railway, it was indicated today following the hearing of petitions from these lines before the public service commission. Klamath county has waived protests to the proposed crossings and there were no other objections to be considered. The Great Northern's petition is in connection with its line now building from Bend to a junction with the Southern Pacific at Cascade. The Oregon Trunk proposal concerns a branch line under construction from Deschutes county to the Southern Pacific junction at Chemult in Klamath county.

# FILM CONCERN TO SEEK CHARGE LIST

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 21. (A. P.)—Dismissal of the indictment charging Louis B. Mayer, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio executive, with conspiracy to commit bribery, will be sought Thursday, the district attorney's office announced. Deputy District Attorney Davis said the action would be based on the ground that investigation proved conclusively that Mayer had acted without criminal intent in participating in pool loans to the Julian Petroleum Corporation. When Mayer learned that the transactions were not legal he made complete restitution, Davis said. The deputy indicated dismissal would be sought in six other similar indictments, all of which charged defendants with receiving more than the legal rate of interest from the Julian organization. The Rev. Ed Vries officiating, I. A. Towey being the funeral director in charge.
