FILM CONCERN TO SEEK CHARGE LIFT

Los Angeles, Sept. 21. (AP)—Dismissal of the indictment charging Louis B. Mayer, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio executive, with conspiracy to commit murder, will be sought Thursday, the district attorney's office announced.

Deputy District Attorney Davis said the action would be based on the ground that investigation proved conclusively that Mayer had acted without criminal intent in participating in pool loans to the Julian Petroleum Corporation.

When Mayer learned that the transactions were not legal, he made complete restitution, Davis said.

The deputy indicated dismissal would be sought in six other similar indictments, all of which charged defendants with receiving more than the legal rate of interest from the Julian organization.
