SALEM, N. H., Oct. 12. LAREDO, Tex., Oct. 12. (UP)—Asserting that the Calles government took advantage of the Mexican uprising to eliminate all opposition to Obregon so that he might be the only candidate to succeed Calles as head of the country, Felix Pataviciari, editor of a Mexico City newspaper, said tonight his deportation was the result of his political fight against Obregon. the sky, might have been near one of the many vessels along the steamer route—longer than the great circle route which Lindbergh, Byrd and Chamberlin chose—the ocean haze might have obscured vision.

44 Hour Supply Unless a steamer catches a spluttering SOS there will be no alarm for Miss Elder's safety until Thursday afternoon, when the plane's 44-hour supply of gasoline will have been exhausted.

If the plane's 400-mile-an-hour average is maintained, the American Girl should be sighted on the French coast at 5 a. m. Thursday.

Lack of news made it impossible to know the fate of the girl who was seeking to accomplish what Princess Anne of Lowenstein-Wertheim, 43, failed to accomplish in the Saint Raphael.

Great Honor Awaits

If Miss Elder succeeds, she will be the first girl to complete a trans-oceanic flight. Besides the aged princess who was lost with the Saint Raphael, Miss Mildred Doran, 21-year-old school teacher of Flint, Mich., attempted a trans-oceanic flight. She was lost in the Miss Doran while over the Pacific in the Dale Air derby from California to Honolulu. It still in the air, Miss Elder and Haldeman, her pilot, face another night of flying before the dawn heralds success of their enterprise.

Flies On Columbus Day

It is fitting that the smiling girl who dared death should be crossing the Atlantic exactly 425 years to the day after Columbus discovered America.

Only a day ago, Ruth was telling, exultantly, of her plans to buy French frocks in Paris. Only a day ago she had chatted as if she were merely making a week-end trip to the country.

The flights of others served to hearten those who hoped for Miss Elder's success. Lindbergh flew almost unscathed until he reached the Irish coast; so did Byrd and Brock and Schlee. Two messages from the passenger liner American Banker told of the one and only time Ruth Elder's plane was sighted.

Flying Due East

Both messages were picked up by the Independent Wireless corporation. The first, received at 5:45 a. m. today—12 1/2 hours after the flight began—said the liner had sighted the monoplane at latitude 41 north, longitude 55.94 west, flying due east, with a northwest wind pushing it along.

The second message, a few hours later, amplified the announcement, saying the plane was flying at an altitude of 1,000 feet, that it flashed several lights as it passed over the steamer, and that the weather was ideal, with a high barometer.

Ships In Path

Miss Elder's plane is similar to that which Brock and Schlee used in their 15,000-mile flight. Her motor, a Wright whirlwind, is like that used by Lindbergh and Byrd.

Ships in the American Girl's path include: Westbound—Leviathan, President Roosevelt, Hyndam, Belkamland, Anranda and Cameronia. Eastbound—Manretanta, Tuscania, France, Penland, Olympic, Minnetonka, Corinthia, Nieuw Amsterdam, Celtic, Caledonia, Gripsholm, Stuttgart and De Grasse.

PARIS, Oct. 12. (UP)—So great is the interest in Ruth Elder's trans-Atlantic flight that France has practically forgotten the three great French flying expeditions now in progress—one to South America, one to India, Syria, and return without a stop. In the excitement over Ruth Elder, the enthusiasm of Parisians transcends even that which marked the hours of waiting for Lindbergh.

High officials will gather at Le Bourget when and if there are indications that the flight is to be successful. Plans for a great reception already have been made.

Messages to the Associated Press received from the steamships Cameronia and Ryndam shortly before 4 p. m. eastern standard time today said neither ship had sighted the American Girl on its flight to Europe. Both ships were steaming in the monoplane's proposed path to Europe.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12. (AP)—Although the steamer lanes were dotted with ocean liners, only one of them had reported seeing the monoplane, the American Girl, almost a full day after it started on its non-stop flight to Paris, and that one sighted the plane within a few hours of its departure.
