Girl Attacker Kept From Mob

FLORENCE, Ariz., Nov. 7. (U. P.)—H. C. Mastin, 25, of Phoenix, is being held in the state prison here tonight to protect him against possible mob violence. He was arrested Sunday morning in Phoenix charged with kidnapping and attacking a 16-year-old girl, who was accompanied by her married sister, age 22. Mastin was placed in the county jail but the gathering of a growing mob made it advisable to move him to the safer quarters of the state prison.

Both women definitely identified Mastin as the man who forced them, at the point of a gun, to enter his car on the streets of Phoenix Saturday night. Mastin then drove into the country. He stopped and forced the older woman, who is married, to leave the machine. He then attacked the younger and drove away, it is said.
