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LAYING THE RAILS

Did it ever occur to you that there is more actual railroad building going on in the Klamath zone than any place else in the United States?

North of this city crews are working hard under the direction of the Hauser Bros. Construction company to put the Great Northern into Klamath Falls before snow flies.

To the southeast of us the Southern Pacific railroad is laying rails on the standard gauge road from Wendell to Lakeview, and just now the crews have completed the track laying to Alturas. It is all in the Klamath Falls territory. To the north it is distinctly Klamath Falls that the Great Northern is attempting to reach.

Just a little more activity than any state has experienced since the war in building railroads. And they are being built for a purpose, a decided purpose. The pine forests where the tonnage exists are the magnets. Large lumber concerns have the timber and have owned it for some time.

The Great Northern is goading its contractors each day to "reach Klamath Falls before the snow flies" and as a result the workers are augmented and the track laying goes merrily on. Behind that Great Northern demand is the demand of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company to get that railroad finished so the supplies and machinery for the big mill can be hauled into this city.

It is a picture of industry and activity—a picture that in this day and age looks good to everyone who enjoys seeing a new country grow, an empire being builded.

A FAVORED LOCATION

Talkative Juror Blames Hearers

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. (AP)—Edward J. Kidwell, famous as "juror number 11" appeared today in the District of Columbia supreme court to ask Justice Siddons for a hearing to clear him of charges that he talked indiscreetly about the Fall-Sinclair conspiracy case before a trial was ordered last Tuesday.

In a long petition prepared for presentation to the court, Kidwell said that J. Ray Akers, street car conductor, and Donald T. King, newspaper reporter, should be adjudged guilty of contempt of court because they persisted in an effort to make him discuss the case while it was on trial.

The juror branded "as absolutely false in all essential averments the affidavits filed by Akers and King and in which they quoted Kidwell as having said that Harry F. Sinclair was a democratic man and that Kidwell would be disappointed if he did not get an auto "as long as a block," after the trial was over.

Kidwell declared in his petition that Akers and King pursued him to the point where he found it necessary to have a friend with an auto come to his assistance in avoiding them. He added that he had told them repeatedly that he could not talk about the case under instructions from the court.

Justice Siddons committed the petition to the files as part of the record in the Fall-Sinclair trial in which the Akers and King affidavits quoting Kidwell were placed but took no action pending formal notification of government counsel that the papers had been filed.

FOUR DEATHS REPORTED.

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 7. (AP)—Four deaths from infantile paralysis have been reported to Dr. W. F. Almond, consultant to the department of public welfare. Two children have died in Moscow, one fatality was reported from near Mountain Home and Earl Ellsworth Walters, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Walters of Boise was the first victim in Boise.

The report to the state welfare department show five proved cases in Boise. Two suspected cases in Boise and one in Pocatello. Boise and Ada county schools from the first to eighth grades are closed.

Feeling in running high, and as a precautionary measure, the court this afternoon issued an order removing from a jeweler's window an exhibit of silver trophies won in rodeos by Lorena. On the grounds that the display might prejudice the jury.

The cowgirl defendant will claim, according to her attorney, Sam A. Jettmore, that she stabbed her common-law husband after he, in a fit of drunken rage, struck her with a wrench.

Throughout the day, the slim little rodeo queen sat nervously and listened to the examination of the jurors. The bronze color of her years of plains life had given way to a prison palar, and at times she was barely able to keep back the tears.

When those cowboys, prospective jurors, rose to her defense in their answers to the attorneys that she had the most trouble keeping down the tears.

The trial opened with the reading of an indictment against the girl rider. It charged that on the night of Sept. 2, Miss Trickey committed first degree murder by stabbing Harris, her common-law husband.

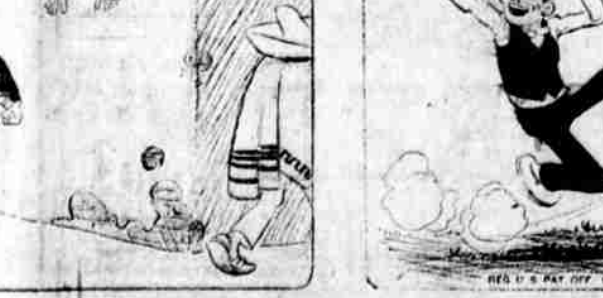
