winds somewhere at sea were the Lepthian, Samaria, Minnehaha, Berlin and Thuringia. All were overdue. The Baltic, Cristobal, Teno, Ceiba and Coamo were expected today, but had not arrived.

The Cunard liner Carmania docked 14 hours late, with the North German Lloyd liner Lucetow, 48 hours behind time. They were the first out of the danger zone.

All passengers of the Lucetow suffered from sea sickness during the voyage from Bremen and Cherbourg and were greeted on landing with the lowest temperature the city has felt this season.

Other ships due today, including small coastal vessels and the great liner Leviathan, wire-leased owners not to expect them on time.

After fishing a few days off Ventura the pair swung their craft back toward this port. Five miles off Point Dume the motor of the Nadina refused to function.

Jenkins and Jenks rigged up blankets for a sail but contrary winds kept them from reaching any land and they were away out of the path of coastwise vessels. They kept alive only by eating the fish that Jenkins caught, he said.
