### Fire And Disease Feared In East

badly damaged. Several residences at Cambridge were reported destroyed by fire this afternoon.

#### Disease Fought

Disease was being fought by Red Cross and government officials. Orders were given in most communities that everyone be vaccinated as a precaution against typhoid.

In several localities, inaccessible to train or motor, airplanes carried the anti-typhus serum.

Although only 74 bodies had been identified tonight, estimates of the total dead ranged from 125 to 150. Property damage remains at \$100,000,000.

General Preston Brown, commander of the first corps area, returned to Boston late today by airplane from an aerial survey of the devastated sections.

"The problem," General Brown said, "is largely an administrative one. However, I have conferred with Red Cross and local relief officers and I believe they are well organized and have a definite plan.

"Damage in Millions  
The amount of damage cannot be estimated accurately at this time, but it is sure to run into many millions.

"Troops are doing everything in their power to help the homeless and to aid in restoring order."

General Brown contradicted reports that there had been looting in some of the flooded sections.

"One of the most impressive things I encountered," he said, "was the spirit these people have shown. There has been no disorder. The spirit of the people has been fine, and great credit to their character."

Roads into Montpelier, General Brown said, were virtually impassable and a serious problem presented itself in getting food into this city.

Supplies were being brought to Montpelier and St. Johnsbury by boat from Port Kent, N. Y.

### Sought Leprosy Germs To Avenge

PORTLAND, Nov. 7. (UPI)—An elaborate plan of William Nash to import leprosy germs from South America and avenge cruel deeds of his enemies, drew the attention of police here tonight and authorities announced they are examining the sanity of Nash.

The startling plot was uncovered by the curiosity of a waitress in a local restaurant.

Nash left a letter in the cafe, police say, which was dated Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, South America, and gave details of "a shipment of leprosy germs, taken from a man who has just died of leprosy." The missive, according to officials, prescribed the best method of "planting" the germs. It was written on a typewriter and signed "Ant."

### Government Is Charged With Jury Tampering

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. (AP)—A charge of jury tampering in the Fall-Sinclair oil case was lodged against the government itself today by Wm. J. Burns.

As a result, H. R. Lamb, an assistant attorney general, was called before the grand jury which earlier in the day had heard Burns defend the activities of the Burns men, who, he said, had been employed by a Sinclair official to watch but not to approach directly, the jury.

Burns' accusation against the prosecution, accompanied by affidavits, was filed with Justice Siddons, the trial judge. The affidavits made by Burns' detectives, said that five days after the trial started, one of the jurors, Norman Glascock, was in conversation with a man who had been driving a car registered in Lamb's name. The same car, one affidavit said, previously had trailed Glascock's car about Washington.

Even before Lamb went into the grand jury rooms, District Attorney Gordon had made a disclaimer of the new charge. He said Lamb was in no sense an investigator for the prosecution in the oil trial but was engaged in the prosecution of anti-trust cases.

### Naval Flyer Is Claiming World Speed Laurels

NEW YORK, Nov. 7. (AP)—All world's speed records for airplanes were shattered today by the claim of Lieutenant Alfred J. Williams, U. S. N., who said he flew 222.6 miles an hour in the first test of his new racing ship since its conversion from a sea to a land plane.

With a 40-mile an hour gale at his back, Williams raced his blue and gold racer over the three-kilometer course of Mitchell field at dusk yesterday to an estimated speed which is the fastest ever traveled by a human being.

It eclipsed by nearly seven miles an hour the mark disclosed Saturday to have been set in Italy by Major Mario De Bernardi, who attained a speed of 215.42 miles per hour in a hydro-plane by official timing. The previous record had been 231.48 miles an hour, established in the recent Schneider cup competition by Flight Lieutenant S. N. Webster of Great Britain.

Lieutenant Williams, who made his own computations with a stopwatch, announced after the trial that he would attempt later this week to set an official record that would stand. He also said he planned to replace his present 1,250 horsepower motor at some future date with a 1,400 horsepower motor that would give him even greater speed.

### Letter Carrier Is Under Arrest

BUCHAREST, Nov. 7. (UPI)—Naval Lieut. M. Theodoru, who was returning from Paris carrying letters, was arrested today at Temiscara, according to official word received here.

He is being brought to Bucharest.

M. Manolescu, former under-secretary of finance was arrested a few weeks ago at the border while carrying letters from former Crown Prince Carol to Rumanian newspapers and Queen-Maria. He is under indictment charged with attempting a coup d'etat and instigation of civil war.

### Fear Foul Play In California Election Today

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7. (AP)—While candidates sounded their last calls to voters to support them, plans were being completed here today to guard against disturbances and "ballot stuffing" in San Francisco municipal election tomorrow.


For the first time in the city's history, it was said, motorcycle officers of the police department will patrol election booths with plain clothes detectives to ward against rumored plans to carry against issues on the ballot by means considered unethical.

Officers were instructed today to see that radio loud speakers are kept silent within 100 feet of the 293 precincts.

The principal interest centered about the mayoralty fight. Mayor James Rolph Jr., incumbent, during the last 14 years is opposed by James E. Power, former postmaster of San Francisco and Aloph Uhl, wealthy wall paper dealer.
