

Booze Trial Is Disappointment

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 14. (AP)—Seekers of thrills who crowded the federal district court today were disappointed in the defense testimony offered in the trial of former salaried Klamath Harbor officer conspiracy cases.

Spectators heard John Dugman, jailer, deny that the Gray Harbor county jail at Montesano was a veritable saloon during the middle of 1925 as pictured in the testimony of Billy Primmer, a government witness, who said while he was in jail from May 28, 1925, to October 24, 1925, that he and the other nine prisoners there were drunk most of the time and that the prisoners came and went as they pleased on Saturdays and Sundays.

Two Sentenced To Life In Pen

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 14. (AP)—Life imprisonment was the sentence imposed upon Alvin Greenwaldt, 38, and Arthur Betzhold, 24, co-plotters in the murder of Greenwaldt's wife, by Circuit Judge C. M. Davidson this afternoon.

They were sentenced after they had pleaded guilty to first degree murder charges. They confessed plotting the murder of Mrs. Greenwaldt, strangled last Monday by Betzhold at Greenwaldt's request.

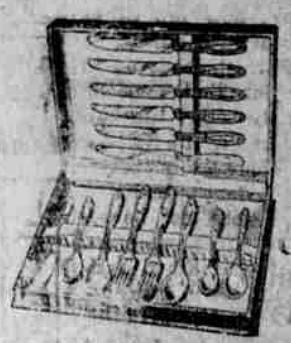
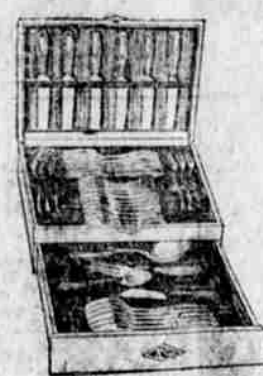
