RENEW PLEA FOR DENTAL COLLEGE

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 14. (AP)—A recommendation of the state board of dental examiners that a department of dentistry be added to the medical college of the University of Oregon, submitted in the report a year ago, is renewed in the annual report for 1926-27 just received by Governor Patterson.

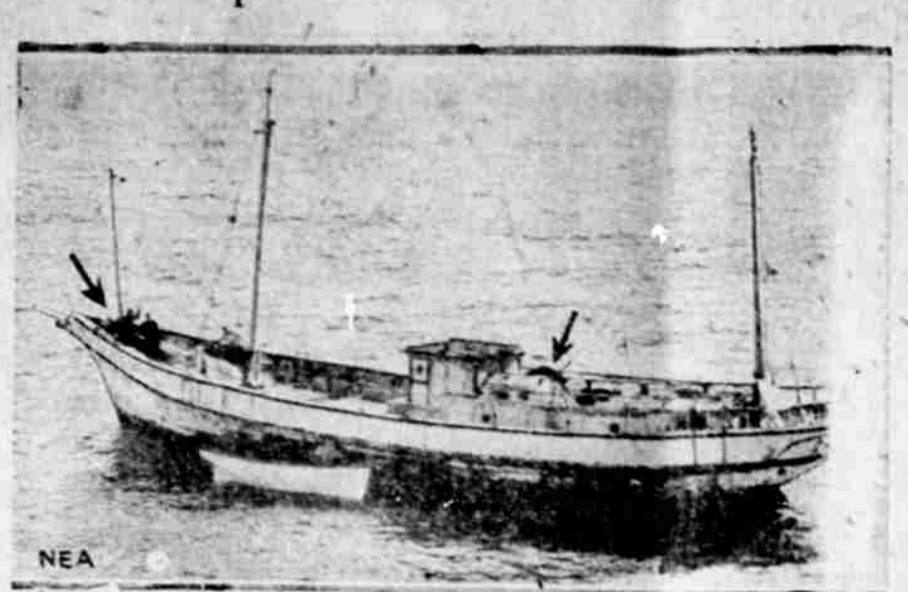
The report shows a total of 1156 registered dentists in the state. Sixty were examined during the year and 61 admitted. Licenses of 15 were revoked and two were prosecuted. Since the department began keeping records the licenses of 249 have been revoked and 424 have died.

Only two corpses of an original crew of 12 Japanese sailors were found aboard this vessel when it was picked up on the ocean by the steamer Margaret Dollar, and towed into Port Townsend, Wash. The others were only picked bones that is, remains. The ship's log in Japanese told of drawing lots to determine who should live to the last. The survivors, up to the last, lived in cannibal style from the flesh of the losers. The arrow at the bow points to the bodies of the last two. MORBID RIOT TO SEE BODIES OF BLAST VICTIMS

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 14. (AP)—A near riot occurred in front of the Allegheny county morgue this afternoon when about 5,000 persons stormed the doors in an effort to view the bodies of victims of today's gas explosion. While a majority were drawn to the death house by mere curiosity, many were seeking missing loved ones. County officers were forced to lock the doors and Coroner W. J. McGraw, crippled war veteran, appeared on the main steps and appealed to the curious to leave. "Leave and give those people whose loved ones are inside their right," commanded the coroner. He stood guard at the door and admitted only those who claimed some relative or friend was missing.
