

TWO SLAYERS SENT TO PEN IN GOOD TIME

Twenty-Four Hours After Crime, Plotters Are Behind Prison Bars

WAUKESHA, Wis., Nov. 14 (UP)—Less than 24 hours after confessing they killed Mrs. Emma Greenwald to collect her insurance, Alvin Greenwald, her husband, and Arthur R. Betzhold, whom Greenwald hired to assist him, were taken to Waukesha penitentiary to begin serving a life sentence.

Pronouncement of sentence today by Judge C. M. Davison ended the "perfect crime" the two admitted they planned to collect a \$10,000 insurance policy carried by Mrs. Greenwald.

Greenwald was found injured and his wife killed, ostensibly by bandits, last week. Police suspected a fiend who had killed and attacked other women in this vicinity and were disposed to believe the husband's story.

Greenwald's position was strengthened further by admission that he was a bootlegger.

But certain circumstances of the murder indicated a motive other than robbery and although Greenwald had allowed Betzhold to beat him, physicians said the injuries sustained were not sufficient to cause the pronounced announcements the bootlegger claimed.

After five days of constant questioning, Greenwald told of his love for another woman and desire for the insurance money. Betzhold drove into the country with the couple, the confession said, and while he was sitting in the rear seat of the automobile with Mrs. Greenwald, he put his arm around her, grabbed her throat and strangled her.

Then they tore the dead woman's clothing, threw her body into a field, Greenwald took his beating and awaited to report to police and collect the insurance.

Betzhold, a bus driver, got two diamond rings Mrs. Greenwald wore for his part in the crime and was to receive \$300 when the bootlegger collected his insurance. He insisted, however, that he participated in the killing "as a favor" to the husband rather

Photo In Hearst Papers Held Fake

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14 (AP)—The Mexican consul, F. A. Pesquera, of Los Angeles last night branded "fakes" the purported official Mexican documents, photostatic copies on which are being published in the Hearst newspapers today, after he had examined them as printed in The Examiner. Belisario Almada, attaché of the Mexican embassy at Washington and now on duty here, voiced the same opinion.

The Mexican officials declared the same or similar documents were offered for sale two months ago to representatives of the Mexican government in this country by Mexican political refugees. The offer of sale allegedly was to prevent their use against the administration of President Calles. When notified of the asserted attempt to obtain large sums for the papers, President Calles was said by the officials to have advised them to disregard the matter.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Secretary Kellogg declined to comment today on the publication of documents in the Hearst newspapers purporting to be reproductions of Mexican official communications.

"The department of state cannot comment on a story based on documentary material concerning the existence and authenticity of what it has no knowledge and no information whatever," he said.

Mexican embassy officials declared the documents were false fabrications and not worthy of comment.

One Dead, Many Injured In Riot

NEW DELHI, India, Nov. 11 (UP)—Several thousand Musselmen participated today in severe race riots which followed the execution of a convicted murderer named Abdul Rashid. One person was killed and 20 seriously injured.

Gathered outside the prison gates, the mobs of Musselmen demanded Rashid's body. When the mobs threatened to break the gates, the authorities delivered the dead Musselmen. Then his co-religionists marched through the streets of New Delhi, carrying Rashid's body.

Hindus attempted to break up the procession and riots resulted.

The military was summoned and restored order after much difficulty. Armored cars were sent into the affected zones.

Lawyer Who Became Bootlegger And Slew Wife, Is All Smiles In Court

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 14 (AP)—Stepping smartly, a look of professional dignity upon his face and his arms full of law books and legal documents, George Remus, the Chicago drugist and lawyer who turned bootlegger, came to court today to justify the slaying of his estranged second wife, Inogene H. Remus here last October 6.

A dozen newspapermen and friends crowded about the stubby, heavyset, bald headed defendant, to grasp his hand. He was all smiles at the greeting. No spectators were in the courtroom at the opening of the trial. The 100 seats were given over to newspapermen. A special venire of 75 had been summoned.

After the veniremen had been cleared out of the spectators, a few of the many who had waited long outside the courtroom were permitted to enter. More than 1,000 crowded about the courtroom door and there were seats for only 110.

Of those who crowded and crashed their way into the courtroom, elderly women predominated. In a loud clear voice Remus read to the court a motion demanding that Franklin L. Dodge Jr., former prohibition agent instrumental in convicting Remus of violating the prohibition law and alleged "sweetheart" of Mrs. Remus; Ruth H. Remus, daughter of the slain woman and adopted daughter of Remus; Grace Campbell, sister of Mrs. Remus, and Harry F. Brown, of Windsor, Ont., be summoned to bring into court any and all papers having to do with a long list of distilleries throughout the middle west.

Over objection of the prosecution, Judge Shook granted the motion.
