Fear Remus May Have Talked Too Loudly In Court

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 19. (AP)—Friends of George Remus admitted today they were worried by the latter's campaign of vehemence in his trial for the murder of his wife, Imogene.

The United Press learned that various men, including two who served time with Remus when he was sent to the Atlanta penitentiary after the government learned he had made millions out of bootlegging, conferred this afternoon to devise means "to call off George."

But it was hard to find one who would go to Remus in his cell and advise him against his policies in conducting his own defense.

Remus was supremely confident that he had not exceeded his rights in threatening the county prosecutor, Charles P. Taft, with physical violence and accusing the assistant prosecutor, Carl E. Basler of drinking "pints and pints" of liquor.

JUVENILE COURT SENDS YOUTH TO REFORM SCHOOL

A 13-year-old youth was sentenced by Judge F. R. Goddard Friday to another term in the reform school on the charge of forgery, and he must remain there until he is 21 years old unless authorities again choose to show leniency.

The boy was sent to the reform school once before by County Judge R. E. Hunnell, but was released by state authorities.
