

Minors Arrested For Watch Theft

Two boys of minor age were haled into police court last night, one for stealing a watch from his uncle and the other for receiving stolen property.

The watch was stolen on Thanksgiving Day from Fred Heffron by his nephew, and yesterday two boys took the watch to a local jeweler to have a new crystal put in. The jeweler opened the back of the watch and found numbers which he had placed there when it was in the shop once before.

He found the name of the owner, called him up and Heffron discovered that the watch was gone. An investigation was started and it was found that his nephew had traded the watch to another boy for a jack knife. The father of the boy who traded for the watch came into court and promised to see that the watch was returned.

Crew Abandons Doomed Vessel

ABERDEEN, Wash., Nov. 26. (UP)—Convinced there was no hope of saving the Teapusan Maru, Japanese freighter, Captain Miyamoto and his crew of 43 men abandoned the vessel today.

With seas comparatively smooth, both life boats and a breeches buoy which had been rigged up by the coast guard were used.

The Teapusan Maru, bound from Shanghai for north Pacific ports, grounded north of Gray Harbor Thursday morning while a gale lashed the Oregon and Washington coast.

Sugar Rate Jump Held In Abeyance

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26. (AP)—A rate increase on sugar from California points to Portland, Oregon, which railroads proposed to make effective Monday, was ordered held in abeyance today by the interstate commerce commission, and present rates maintained until June 25. Meanwhile an investigation into the contemplated rate change will be made.

The present sugar rate from San Francisco to Portland is 15 1/2 cents per 100 pounds while the new schedule proposed a rate of 28 1/2 cents, while from Tracy, California to Portland an increase from 15 1/2 to 26 cents was contemplated, these changes illustrating the effect of the new schedule in its entirety.

Tribal Payment Made To Indians

Every adult of the Klamath Indian tribe was issued a check for \$200 yesterday from different centers on the reservation. Approximately \$200,000 was distributed.

The money is derived principally from sale of timber units which belong to the Indians to timber companies. The money which is paid as the timber is cut is deposited in the United States treasury to await the word of Indian service officials for distributing it.

This is the second payment which has been made in 1927, the first being \$200 per capita. The payments to minor Indians are not made direct but are put out at interest.
