IMMIGRATION ON BORDER CURBED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (UP)—America's border patrol made great strides in curbing illegal entry of immigrants during the last fiscal year which ended June 30. Secretary of Labor Davis announced today.

During the year the patrol apprehended 75,382 persons, compared with 5,580 last year. Of this number more than 12,998 were aliens smuggled across the border.

The patrol, entering its third year, guards the Mexican and Canadian borders.

Markets

PORTLAND, Nov. 29. (UP)—Continuing the downward movement which started last week, egg prices on the local produce market eased a bit further at the Dairy Exchange meeting yesterday afternoon when the prices on extras and firsts were reduced. Extras took the largest drop, receding 3c to 40c while firsts dropped from 37c to 36c. Other grades remain unchanged. Mediums at 34c and undersized at 30c. Association prices are: Extras 42c; firsts 35c; mediums 36c; undersized 32c.

Further drop in egg prices may be expected, according to local dealers unless the peak of the winter lay in March.

Butter prices are firmer with all grades up a cent except firsts which are quoted 1/2c higher than yesterday. The strengthening in the market is the result of sub-normal production and the gradual decrease of the storage supply.

Following a strengthening of the North Portland stockyards prices yesterday, country dressed meats are a trifle firmer on the local market this morning. Choice veal is up from 35c to 36c, the best bringing 18c while light hogs are stronger at 13 1/2c; little change is noted in the poultry market which has been decidedly irregular since early last week due to the abnormal receipts and small demand. Poultry dealers are quoting prices over a wide range on most classes of birds though the market on fancy and choice fowls is fairly steady.

The fruit and vegetable market is firm in most classes of produce today with only trifling changes in quotations. Potato prices are steady as are apples and root crops.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 29. (AP)—An investigation of a report that Charles A. Osler of Kelo and Mrs. Minnie J. Burrows of 510 Newton street, Medford, were married before Mr. Osler was divorced from a former wife is being made here today following the receipt of a letter from the former Mrs. Osler who claims that a divorce was not granted until last week while the marriage took place September 30 of this year.

In a letter written to the county clerk, the ex-wife, who has resumed the name of Ruth Angle Smith, Kelo, states that she has learned that Osler and Mrs. Burrows were married in Roseburg on the 30th of September. She states that she started divorce proceedings on the 15th of September, and that the first decree was not received until last week.

She says in her letter that she understands Osler and his present wife have separated.

Osler and Mrs. Burrows obtained a license here on the 30th of September and were married by County Judge George K. Quine. Osler who gave his age as 65 said he had been married three times. Mrs. Burrows gave

her age as 60 and it is her second marriage.

The letter has been turned over to District Attorney Gordon who is making an investigation into the facts of the case.

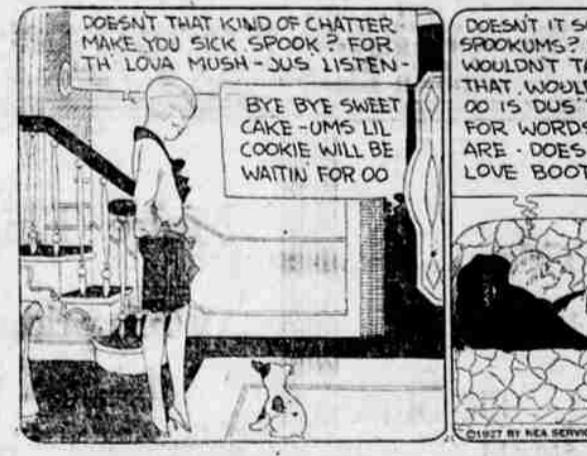

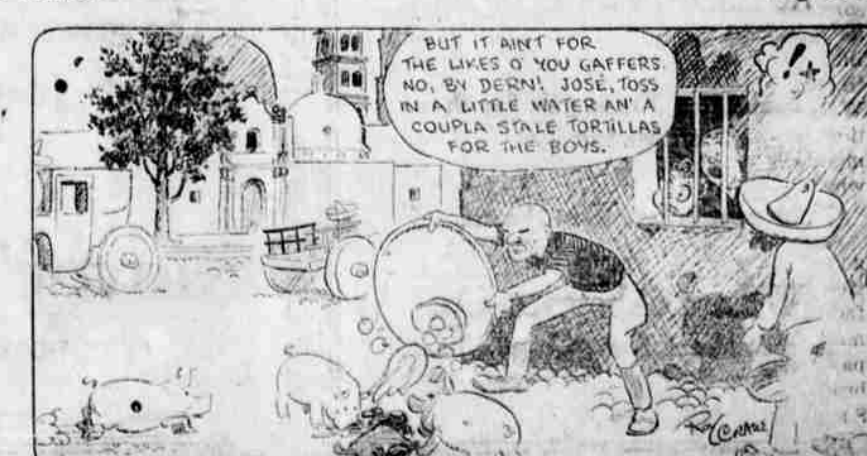
