

### Electric Power Expected To Be Leading Issue

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(U. P.)—One of the warmest battles in the coming session of congress is expected to revolve about the electric power industry.

Disposition of Muscle Shoals and Boulder dam, to come before the session which convenes Monday, may open up a bitter fight between the advocates of the various plans for these monumental projects.

Already Washington is surcharged with charges and counter-charges of an immense "super power" lobby and threats of congressional investigation into the alleged monopolistic control of the power industry.

In an open letter to Senator Thomas J. Walsh, Montana democrat, who has announced his intention of re-introducing his resolution for an investigation into the control of electric power, Gifford Pinchot charges a nationwide monopoly.
