WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.--(U. P.1-One of the warmest battles in the coming session of congress is expected to revolve about the electric power industry.

Disposition of Muscle Shoals and Boulder dam, to come be-fore the assiston which convenes Monday, may open up a bitter fight between the advocates of the various plans for these monu-

mental projects, Already Washington is surcharged with charges and counter-charges of an immense "super power" lobby and threats of congressional investigation into the alleged monopolistic control of the power industry.


