The card, which offers 32 rounds of boxing, is to be staged in the Chilquin arena, scene of many an exciting fight racket during the past year.

Holman is well known to Klamath county fans, having made several appearances here in the past, usually against Klamath leather pushers. His event with Gorman has whipped up considerable interest among fans, as the latter is a new flash in southern Oregon rings.

The ever-popular glove slinger of the Pelican City, Mike Daly, is signed to go six furious rounds with Billy Huff in the semi-windup tonight at Chilquin.

Just home from Medford where last week he stole the spotlight from the main event fight, Mike is in excellent trim to put the gloves to Huff in their fight tonight. The two boys fought a draw recently in one of the best bouts in Chilquin's ring history, and their match this evening should be quite as exciting as the last one.

BIG LEAGUE PARLEY WILL START TODAY

Managers National Ball
Clubs Convening in
Dallas, Texas

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 5. (U.P.)—Many new faces in the managerial ranks, but familiar to the baseball fans of the nation, appeared tonight for the official opening of the annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball leagues tomorrow.

They spent the evening, for the most part, in groups about hotel lobbies, in quest of new players for their debut in the managerial role next season.

There was Billy Evans, who has quit umpiring to manage the Cleveland Indians. Evans is to meet Tris Speaker tomorrow. The veteran Tris has been visiting home folks at Hubbard City, Texas.

With Evans was Clarence Howard, who also attempted managing a major league team—the Chicago White Sox—but who has given that up to become an umpire in the same league.

Walter Johnson, idol of pitchers, who has at last become a club manager, is in search of players for the Newark team of the International league. Johnson's search was postponed tonight, however, when he met Gabby Street, another major league veteran, and once Johnson's battery partner.

Although well along in years, Street is still catching the fast ones—he said—as well as he did for the Big Six twenty years ago. Street played with August last year, but it is rumored that he is negotiating with officials of the Memphis club of the Southern association and may succeed Clyde Milan as manager there next year.

Dick Kinsella, New York Giant scout, declined to admit that a trade was in prospect to bring Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker to the Giants next season.

The new Central league was organized this afternoon, with President Harry Smith of Columbia presiding. Clubs in the new league will be Dayton, Akron, Canton, Youngstown and Springfield, in Ohio, Richmond and Fort Wayne, Indiana, and Erie, Pa.

The constitution of the American Association was redrafted and adopted at a meeting of the league this afternoon. The most important change made provides that no club can sell its franchise until after the proposal has been passed upon by the league.

Attendance at the meeting already exceeds 500, with others arriving tomorrow. Chattanooga, Tenn., was the first city to enter its bid for the 1928 meeting.

no government subsidy, either direct or indirect. We want to avoid putting the government in business and therefore insist on a law that will require each marketed unit of the commodity to pay its share in the cost of its own stabilization and production.

It is claimed that the provisions of the McNary-Haugen bill would allow the farmer to pay the cost of operation of government machinery to save him from ruin in seasons of farm product surpluses.

Idea Winning Out
Thompson asserted that all economic interests of the country were slowly being won over to the principle of government aid first advocated in the middle west.

"It is a mistake to assume that the effort to secure a law for the stabilization of agriculture is a contest in which agriculture is lined up on one side and that all the industrial forces of the country are lined up on the other," he explained. "This was practically the situation five years ago, but today many of the greatest industrial forces of our country are ardent supporters of the plan."

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INJURIES OF TESREAU FELT BY ALL-STARS

Wert's Chances to Win

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5. (U.P.)—The injury of big Louis Tesreau, plunging halfback of the University of Washington football team, in Saturday's game against U.S.C. was a body blow to the hopes of the western all-star team which will meet an eastern all-star team here December 26.

According to information received by the Shrine committee in charge of the game, it is doubtful if Tesreau's injury will be healed in time for him to participate in the game, and his loss will be weakening to the already none too strong western aggregation.

Organizers of the west team have only one more hope of getting together a team which will be of the calibre of the eastern team assembled by Andy Kerr. Representatives of the committee will go before the conference committee in Portland this week and ask that the conference rule which prohibits any players who intend to represent their schools in winter or spring sports from playing in the game, be suspended.

If the rule is suspended the team will be bolstered by the addition of the two greatest west coast football stars—Morley Drury, U.S.C. quarterback, and Larry Hettencourt, St. Mary's, center.

Drury plays on the U.S.C. basketball team, and Hettencourt, who already has major league offers, will play baseball for St. Mary's.

With Tesreau out of it, the heavy work in the backfield will fall on "Devil May" Kaer and "Cowboy" Kutsch.
