Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 6. (A. P.)—Reflecting a substantial increase in consumption, egg prices turned upward at the dairy exchange meeting yesterday afternoon. Extras climbed 2c to 20 while flats rose 1 1/2c to 35c; prices on other grades are unchanged. The stiffening in egg prices is somewhat of an upset of market "dope" as prices have been on the decline steadily for the last two weeks and production has been far in excess of consumption.

Butter prices are unchanged with a steady tone pervading. Country dressed meats and poultry are steady, although the market is quiet and demand light. Markets are still light and the market is cleaning up on hold-over stock.

In the vegetable and fruit division, market conditions are changed little from last week. Trading has been light with prices of most commodities holding firm.

Local cauliflower is nearing the end of the season and what little is being offered is moving easily at \$1.75 to 2.00 per crate.

HOUSE AROUND TREE LOSSES WILLOW LANDMARK

CHICAGO, Dec. 6. (AP)—The "house built 'round the tree'" has lost the attribute that made it a landmark for many years in Oak Park, Chicago's west side residential suburb. A spreading willow tree that kicked its trunk up through the kitchen of the sprawling, picturesque mansion has been cut down.

The home was built by Frank Lloyd Wright, noted architect, more than a third of a century ago.

When the contractor informed him it would be necessary to cut down a young willow tree to make room for the foundation, Mr. Wright would not allow it to be destroyed.

So the contractor built the house around the willow, and its green branches piercing the roof long were a sight for visitors.

New tenants found the willow a nuisance and it felt the axe.

University Will Erect Buildings

BERKELEY, Cal., Dec. 6. (A. P.)—New buildings to cost approximately \$1,550,000 are to be constructed on the University of California campus as soon as architects can complete the plans, it has been announced by President W. W. Campbell.

These new buildings are the first unit of a \$6,000,000 program authorized by the last legislature.

Two buildings comprise this first unit, a life science building to cost about \$1,500,000, and a new infirmary which will cost about \$350,000.
