Accustomed to the greetings of kings, presidents and the public of many lands, Lindbergh took this Mexican greeting in his accustomed easy manner.

To Embassy
He shook hands with the president and with Ambassador Morrow, received the salute of Will Rogers, doffed his hat to the wildly cheering throng. Twenty-seven minutes after the Spirit of St. Louis had landed, Lindbergh was part of a motor cavalcade which moved, in majestic procession, to the American embassy, where he will stay during his Mexican sojourn. The so-called animosity which had prevailed for a time when relations between the United States and Mexico were none too amicable, was entirely forgotten in the fervid demonstration of welcome for the ace of all aces. The fervor of their welcome was at the breaking point. Lindbergh's delayed arrival had brought every spectator at the two mile square Valbuena field to the utmost pitch of emotionalism.

By Stampede
His dramatic appearance in the blue cloud-flecked sky was the signal for the outburst of those emotions. They went wild, those thousands of Mexicans and the handful of Americans at the field. They stormed like cattle on a stampede, onto the field as the monoplane skimmed down to its landing place. How accidents were averted never can be known; it was miraculous. The plane, charging down the field, found frantic humans in its path, struggling for a chance to touch fame. Somehow the humans got out of the plane's way.

It had been the same at Le Bourget. It was a scene to be remembered in the history of American Mexican relations. After the formal greetings of the president and the ambassador the functionaries swung their program into action. Lindbergh's trusted friend, the Spirit of St. Louis, was put into a hangar. Lindbergh entered an automobile. Ambassador Morrow, Mrs. Morrow, General Alvarez and Colonel McNabb entered the same car. It swung into line, right behind the automobile of the president of the republic. Hats flew into air, shouts of "long live Lindbergh" swept across the field, the cavalcade to the American embassy had begun. Lindbergh occupied a back seat in the open car, smiling to the throng which gave him
