APPOINTMENT OF CONSTABLES IS OFFICER'S WORRY

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 15. (AP)—Just the governor of Oregon... The question is now worrying the Oregon executive and the attorney general will be asked for an opinion. The question arises with a vacancy in Lincoln county. Prior to the November election of 1926 vacancies in the office of justice of the peace were filled by the county court. At the November election of that year the people adopted a general constitutional amendment relative to the governors filling vacancies in public offices including judgeships. The attorney general ruled that justice of the peace were included so Governor Patterson has appointed a number of justices of the peace, although prior to his administration they were appointed by the county court. Now, it develops, there is a constitutional provision that vacancies in the office of constable shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies in the office of justice of the peace. Hence the question whether vacancies in cross road constabularies will have to be filled by the governor.

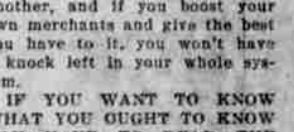

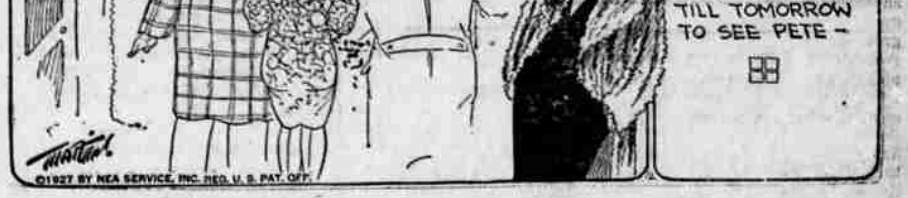
