

PROSPECTS OF OLYMPIC PLAY LURE RUNNERS

Paddock and Locke Both Getting in Trim For Amsterdam Trip

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—The alluring prospect of a trip to the 1928 Olympic games at Amsterdam and a check at athletic glory more enduring than national fame has tempted back to the board tracks of the present winter a number of American runners who, for one reason or another, were virtually in retirement from active competition.

Two of the greatest sprinters developed in the United States within the past decade, Charley Paddock and Roland Locke, are working out on the boards and may be tempted into some of the bigger and better indoors meets in the metropolitan area.

Locke, who holds the world's record for 220 yards, having bettered Paddock's mark, recently had his tonsils removed, and believes that with that load off his chest he will be faster than ever.

Another crack sprinter who will attempt to flash sufficient form during the winter and spring to win a place on the team is Bob McAllister, erstwhile "flying cop," holder of a couple of indoor marks.

It is the fact that McAllister holds these marks which has tempted Paddock back to the eastern boards. Charley swore he never would run in the east, particularly indoors, but now he says that if a 100 yard straightaway can be found—and there's a good one in Brooklyn—he will come here next month for competition.

Schaefer Leads In Championship Billiard Match

NEW YORK, Dec. 21. (UP)—The world's championship 18.2 balkline billiard match between Welker Cochran and Jake Schaefer was all but concluded Wednesday afternoon when the challenger piled up a lead of 447 points over the champion.

When the players went to the table for the final block the score stood: Schaefer 1,200, Cochran 753.

Both played highly indifferent billiards during the fourth block, Schaefer having a high run for the afternoon of 71.

Bitter complaint was made by the champion regarding the balls used during the championship match.

"How can they expect me to make caroms with those cannon balls?" demanded Cochran.

Schaefer was equally dissatisfied, and on one occasion missing a draw shot by at least one foot, he exclaimed:

"Well, that's as close as I can expect to come under such conditions."

French Davis Cup Committee Winds Up Tourney Stand

PARIS, Dec. 21. (UP)—The French Davis cup committee has completed practically all arrangements for the 1928 Davis cup play.

The committee today fixed the finals definitely for July 27, 28 and 29. The first round of the European zone must be finished by May 8, the second round, May 20; third round, June 12; semi-finals, June 24, and the European zone finals must be decided by July 15.

The interzone final will be played July 29, 31 and 22. President Doumergue, taking a lead out of President Coolidge's book, will hold the draw for the Davis cup matches at the Elysee, the French white house, in the presence of diplomats on February 3.

The switching of the Davis cup battleground from Forest Hills to Paris has reawakened interest in the trophy and most of the 22 Davis cup playing nations are expected to make their entries before Doumergue shakes the slips in a box.

Phil McGraw Slated For Knockout, Says Sid Terris

NEW YORK, Dec. 21. (UP)—Sid Terris of New York and Phil McGraw of Detroit meet in a boxing ring for the third time Friday night in a 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden.

Rated the leading challenger of the lightweight division, Terris will enter the ring a 2 1/2 or three to 1 favorite. The winner will meet Jimmy McLarin of Los Angeles at the garden on February 3. McLarin recently knocked out Louis Kaplan and beat Billy Wallace. He has never fought in New York.

After being knocked down four times in the first round, Terris stayed on his feet to win a close decision from McGraw in their first bout. Terris lost the second bout on a foul in the second round.

Both Terris and McGraw completed training today. Terris promises to knock out McGraw to establish a clear claim to his superiority over the Detroit Greek.

Rogers Hornsby Won't Have To Pay Race Bets

CLAYTON, N. D., Dec. 21. (UP)—A jury today refused to award Frank L. Moore the \$15,000 which Moore claimed Rogers Hornsby, the ball player, owed him on race horse bets. The jury was out about an hour and a half.

The suit was originally filed by Moore for \$32,000. This amount was subsequently reduced until the final figure was reached. Moore contended that he and Hornsby had a betting agreement whereby Moore placed the bets and furnished the tips and they divided the winnings.

The agreement extended over two years, it was claimed, and the original amount sued for represented gambling losses and loans to Hornsby and his wife.

Portland Heavyweight to Meet Popular Gorman At Chiloquin

CHILOQUIN, Dec. 21. (Special)—Supporters and camp followers of Nails Gorman, Chiloquin's newly adopted heavyweight fighter, were in an uproar here today with the arrival of Lefty Vaughan, Portland's coming heavyweight slasher, who will meet Gorman in the main event of the Christmas smoker at Chiloquin, Friday evening, December 23.

Vaughan looked bigger than the proverbial mountain to the many fight fans in this city who were placing all their money on the Hood River knockout king, Nails Gorman. Gorman in his first appearance here three weeks ago won a fight over the popular Larry Holman of Bend by the K. O. route in the fifth canto.

This looks like a real battle in the offing with both boys having plenty of supporters. In his six, middleweight sensation, will look horns with Gene O'Grady of Ashland.

Jack Davies, popular boxer from this city, will face Snell Harris of Ashland in a special six round event which promises to be a fast go. These boys fought in Ashland recently and Harris won the decision.

Harold Wright, Indian boy (crusher), and Harry Sams, Chiloquin boy, have been signed to go through four round ones. These boys put on the curtain raiser in the last fight here and proved to be one of the best matches of the evening.

Kid Copeland, Fort Klamath's champion lightweight, will meet Eddie Jones of Medford Point, who is the champ of that section of the country. Both these boys are Indians and will show four rounds of fast boxing with both trying for a knockout.

The Chiloquin Boxing Commission is sponsoring this card which includes 10 rounds of high class boxing and it will be up to the standard of the best Chiloquin card. Ashland is coming over in a body to see their two battles in action and much money is being placed on the favorites by their rabid supporters.

Jacobs Buys Up Jack Delaney's Fight Contract

NEW YORK, Dec. 21. (UP)—The familiar combination of Jack Delaney, former light heavyweight champion of the world, and Pete Reilly, who has been in the French-Canadian's corner as manager for a number of years, was ended today when Joe Jacobs purchased Delaney's contract, as well as that of Sammy Vogel, lightweight, for \$50,000. Reilly, who is retiring from the boxing game, released the two boxers to Jacobs, who signed a two-year contract with Delaney and one for three years with Vogel.

Jacobs announced that Delaney will continue to fight as a heavyweight, and will challenge Jack Sharkey and other contenders for Gene Tunney's title.
