Colorado River Debate To Make Congress Soon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. (UPI)—Assurance that a Colorado river development will reach both houses of Congress early in the present session was given today when the House irrigation and reclamation committee voted to limit hearings to the period January 6-14 and then proceed at once to frame a report. The Senate irrigation committee voted yesterday to conclude hearings on Colorado river development measures on January 21.

At the House committee meeting today Representative Lewis Douglas of Arizona, where there is bitter opposition to the Boulder dam project for river development, urged that the hearing be more extensive and come later in the session. He was overruled by a majority of the committee.

Patterson Says Contract Award Discriminatory

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 21. (AP)—Governor Patterson in a telegraphic letter today to President Coolidge, charges the federal lighthouse bureau with discrimination in the awarding of a lightship contract. The governor's letter takes the form of a vigorous protest.

"As governor of the state of Oregon," says the letter, "I wish to enter vigorous protest against discrimination of federal lightship contract. Reports show Albion Marine Iron Works, located at Portland, Ore., has submitted bid to build vessel at \$65,000 less than next lowest bid, and offers sufficient bond to insure delivery 20 days in advance of specified date, yet Lightship bureau reported here as denying them contract."

The letter requests the president to "use every thing at your command to place this contract with the Albion Marine Iron Works at Portland, Ore."

Senator Fess Is Shifting Support

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. (UP)—Under grueling cross-examination Edward J. Kidwell steadfastly reiterated today that Assistant District Attorney James O'Leary had made him swear to an affidavit containing untruths and designed for use in the Sinclair-Burns contempt case.

Kidwell, a juror in the case of Harry F. Sinclair and Albert B. Fall, growing out of the Teapot Dome naval oil lease, has bolted in and out of the contempt proceedings since that trial was abruptly ended and charges were made that Burns detectives had shadowed the jury for Sinclair. He made his charges against O'Leary yesterday and today he repeated them.
