

Bud Taylor Says He'll Be Victor Over Canzoneri

NEW YORK, Dec. 29. (UP)—"I will beat Canzoneri or retire from the ring," announces Bud Taylor of Terre Haute, N. B. A. bantam champion, who meets the Brooklyn Italian in Madison Square Garden Friday night in a bout which will go a long way towards straightening out the tangled situation in the feather-weight ranks.

Tony Canzoneri and Taylor are meeting at the featherweight limit, the winner to be matched with Benny Bass of Philadelphia in a bout for the 126-pound championship.

The Brooklyn boy is a 7 to 5 favorite despite two previous setbacks by Taylor.

When Coaches Get Together

Four of the country's most successful football coaches got together recently and among other subjects discussed was:

"The Greatest Player I Ever Coached."

When I tell you that the coaches were Knute Rockne, Tad Jones and Howard Jones and "Pop" Warner, and you stop to consider the mighty men in mole skin who have played under these football emperors, you will appreciate what it means to have such first-hand judgment on such a subject.

First of all, Tad Jones' choice may surprise you, although it didn't surprise me. The Yale coach named Bruce Caldwell.

"Just about as great a back as I ever saw or heard of," said Tad, referring to the youngster who was rendered ineligible before the major games of his last season.

Kicker, passer, ball carrier, blocker and tackler, Caldwell could do just about everything in as clean cut fashion, with more drive and energy and accuracy, than any back of the year.

If I were selecting an All-American eleven based upon my own opinion, Bruce Caldwell would be the first choice.

Well, after Tad Jones had surprised every one by naming Caldwell, it was generally expected that "Pop" Warner would name Jim Thorpe, the mighty Indian.

But "Pop" said no, that Ernie Nevers, now a professional, was a more valuable football player than Thorpe.

"If Thorpe had possessed Nevers' temperament, he might have been the greater, but Jim was lazy. He wasn't trying all the time. Ernie was, and Ernie could do just about anything with a football when he tried."

Warner said he rated Nevers as the greatest back of all time, certainly the superior of Drury, this year's Pacific coast star.

Drury, naturally, was Howard Jones' choice. The Southern California captain did not set the stands afire with his performance in the Notre Dame game. He kicked well, alternated with Jess Hibbs, who is now All-American, passed and started like a streak of lightning from punt formation. But he did not seem at home on the slippery field, he fumbled a couple of times, and he missed the kick which would have meant at least a tie for the Trojans.

Knute Rockne agreed that the late George Glipp was his greatest gridiron production. Of all the stars turned out by the master astronomer of Notre Dame, Glipp shone most brightly.

They would make quite a backfield, these four—Marley Drury at quarterback, Caldwell and Glipp half-backs and Nevers fullback. I do not think Drury quite belongs in that company.

The Trojan captain and his team-mates were somewhat overrated this year, in my opinion. Notre Dame took their measure at Soldier Field, outplaying them in every department.

Knute Rockne Is Ready for Tour

NEW YORK, Dec. 29. (UP)—While his fellow coaches were busy condemning the football rules and demanding a voice in the making of them, Knute W. Rockne, Notre Dame gridiron mentor, went out today and signed up an ocean liner.

Rockne signed contracts whereby he engaged the Cunard liner Carmania for a privately conducted tour, under his auspices, which will leave New York July 20 and return September 2.

The Rockne tourists will take in the Olympic games and afterwards visit Venice, Rome, Paris, London and Glasgow.

The coach will act as guide for anyone wishing to make the trip.

Meeting Place of Minor Clubs Set

CHICAGO, Dec. 29. (UP)—Meeting of minor league baseball presidents to consider the draft question will be held at Chicago instead of West Baden, Ind., on January 9.

Mike Sexton, president of the national association of minor leagues announced tonight. The meeting place was changed to facilitate communication with Baseball Commissioner Landis.

Sexton said the meeting would determine whether present relations with the major league clubs shall end January 14, or whether they shall continue for the term of Landis' office.

American association club owners will assemble January 8 to decide on what action will be taken should the minor league association refuse to rescind the action at Dallas providing for abrogation of the present major-minor agreement.

At The Pine Tree

WILL ALTER GRID RULES BUT LITTLE

Only Minor Changes Are Contemplated for 1928 Football, Report

NEW YORK, Dec. 29. (UP)—No changes in the football rules are contemplated, other than certain minor ones for the purpose of clarifying, adjusting and perfecting provisions at present in effect.

With these words, which concluded his address before the annual convention of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, E. K. Hall of Dartmouth, chairman of the football rules committee, quieted much of the tumult over the gridiron code which has surrounded wherever coaches and officials have gathered here this week.

The football coaches, who hold their annual meeting on Friday, have yet to be heard from, but the delegates to the N. C. A. A. convention, as well as the eastern football officials, warmly applauded Hall's defense of the present rules.

Defends System
The chairman did not arbitrarily insist upon the retention of the present code, but in an address which he traced the growth of the game for the past 20 years Hall made a studied defense of the rules, and explained the purpose of regulations now in effect which have drawn the fire of many football men.

"Never have we seen better football," said the rules committee chairman, referring to the 1927 season. "As long as we can hold the game essentially as it is today, we will apparently have the finest kind of a game—open, clean, safe, fast, interesting, and with such a wealth of strategic possibilities that the underdog always has his chance to come back and the defeated team an opportunity to win the following week."

Peaceful Session
After all the talk of demands for changes in the rules, the return of the goal posts to the goal line and other disputed points, today's meeting turned out to be essentially one of peace.

The National collegiate athletic association established peace in Olympic circles by voting to return to the American Olympic association from which the N. C. A. A. resigned in a huff a year ago.

It was voted to hold the track and field games of the N. C. A. A. at Chicago, June 8-9, the wrestling at Ames, Iowa, March 20-21, and the swimming at the University of Pennsylvania March 30-31.

Wants New Ball Rules
The report of the baseball committee headed by Dr. Edgar Fauser of Wesleyan recommended that the N. C. A. A. appoint a committee to draw up a new set of playing rules to govern college baseball. The committee reported that the present professional rules, which heretofore have governed college baseball as well, are not suitable in their entirety, to place the drafting of a set of intercollegiate baseball rules in the hands of a special committee.

Bandits Stage Daring Holdup In City Store

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 29. (UP)—A second daring grocery store holdup within 36 hours was staged here last night when three masked and armed men held up three clerks and two customers in a downtown store of the Bayless grocery company. They escaped with a sack of money.

J. D. Bayless, head of the chain, said that the exact amount would not be known until a checkup, but that he thought the amount would be under \$100. The loss was small, he said, because the bandits were frightened before they could open the register.

After lining up the clerks and customers, the robbers grabbed the sack at the side of the money drawer, the approach of a pedestrian frightened them and they fled to an automobile.

Captain Allen of the Phoenix police department said he did not think the men were the same who yesterday held up Joseph Strickling of the Arizona Grocery company and escaped with \$13,000 cash and \$22,000 in checks. The car used in this holdup was recovered in Capitol park and is held by the police. It contained a sawed-off shotgun, but gave no clue to the bandits, police said.

CHICAGO, Dec. 29. (UP)—Charles W. Gray, president of the Yellow Cab company, left an estate to his widow of more than \$1,000,000, his will disclosed today.
