

California Bears Win Regatta; 27 Year Record Demolished

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 19. (UP)—California's powerful eight pulled its shell to a thrilling victory in the Poughkeepsie regatta today here tonight.

Columbia, which fought California for leadership to the very finish line, came in second. Washington, which in years gone by has written glowing pages in boating history, was in third place. Cornell, Navy and Syracuse finished in the order named, with Pennsylvania last by a considerable margin.

To win the race California had to row the four-mile course in 18 minutes 35.4 seconds, breaking a record which had stood for 27 years by 17.2-5 seconds. Cornell had made the previous record of 18 minutes, 53.1-5 seconds in 1901.

The varsity race was the climax of a great day on the river. The Navy had rowed to victory, with Cornell second and Syracuse third. In the freshman race, then the Navy came back with the second event, with Cornell again second and Syracuse once more third.

But the great race was the varsity, which never fails to produce its heroes.

Columbia and California were the favorites. Columbia took an early lead after a brush with Cornell. California pulled a hard and steady stroke, content with a place farther back until the approach of the bridge which marked the end of three miles.

Then California made its bid for leadership and as the boats passed, closely bunched, under the railroad bridge, the California eight forged half a length ahead of Columbia.

They rowed in that position through the next half mile. Columbia rowing its heart out in a valiant effort to head off the speeding Californians. At the last half-mile Columbia was still challenging and it closed a lead which California had momentarily built into a length, back to half a length.

Through the final half Columbia would not be shaken off. Both California and Columbia were fighting with the last ounce of their power. California's final ounce was enough to send her shell scooting across the line in a brilliant burst of speed, a winner.

In the last mile the two leaders steadily pulled away from the

field, but Washington was still fighting in familiar Washington style and gradually drew up, coming over the finish line in third place and with some added glory for west coast oarsmen.

Navy's strong freshman crew stroked its way down the rain-swept Hudson river to win the first event of the 34th annual intercollegiate regatta, the freshman crew race. Cornell was second, Syracuse third, Washington fourth.

Navy's time was 9 minutes, 42 seconds.

Syracuse was away in the lead at the start but was headed by the Navy as the boats pulled, closely bunched, under the bridge marking the end of the first mile.

Cornell soon was pulling out into second place, and at times the Navy had no better than a quarter length lead. In the last half mile Cornell made a valiant challenge, pulling well ahead of Syracuse and Columbia.

The Navy increased its stroke and its stronger men led the way across the line, with Cornell's freshmen badly tied.

Washington and California, from the Pacific coast, were at no time serious contenders and Pennsylvania was never better than fourth.

Annapolis won the second event also, taking first in a thrilling duel with Cornell, with spectators uncertain which was the winner when the shells slipped over the finish line. Cornell was second.

Navy's time in the junior varsity three-mile race was 14 minutes, 18 seconds. Five shells were bunched together within a length of each other as they crossed the finish line.

Navy's time was a new record for this race. The old record was 15 minutes, 40.1-5 seconds.

The official order of the finish of the second race was: Navy, Cornell, Syracuse, Washington, Columbia, Pennsylvania.

California was not entered.

Shortly after the junior varsity race and 15 minutes before the time set for the four-mile varsity race, main event of the day, a heavy downpour started and it became so dark spectators scarcely could see across the Hudson.

The river became alarmingly choppy and a stiff wind was blowing out of the northeast.

Columbia was the first crew to arrive at the starting line for the big varsity race. This crew,

RED GRANGE TO QUIT FOOTBALL

CHICAGO, June 19. (UP)—Harold "Red" Grange, whose career in college and professional football was the most sensational in recent sporting history, announced today that he had retired permanently from the gridiron.

In making the announcement it also was disclosed that Grange and C. C. Pyle, the man who promoted "Red" professionally, had parted company formally. This latter rumor had been afloat ever since the transcontinental "bunton" race which the two promoted jointly.

"Grange has retired permanently from football owing to the condition of his knee," a statement by the two former partners announced. "He feels he does not care to play unless he can give the public his best."

The statement explained that the two were severing relations because each had "various interests" which needed individual attention.

Pyle will devote his future to his interests, the statement added, while Grange will have as his representative Frank Zambrano, Chicago. The nature of Grange's field was not made known.

Cardinals Defeat Reds; Score 9-4

CINCINNATI, June 19. (UP)—Old Pop Alexander was responsible for putting the Reds three full games behind St. Louis today. The stifling Ohio valley heat caused Alexander to retire in favor of Sherdel in the seventh, but the game was already on ice and the Cardinals finally roosted a notch higher in first place by the score of 9-4.

Walker, Hudkins Both Confident; Taking It Easy

CHICAGO, June 19. (UP)—Confidence, that necessary and excusable feeling resting within every fighting man, broke forth in great volume today from the camps of Mickey Walker, the champion, and Ace Hudkins, the challenger, as the two settled back to wait the 10 round mid-dleweight title bout Thursday night.

Today's workouts were light and both laid aside their sparring gloves tonight announcing they were ready to step into the ring for the fight that, according to the ballyhoo, will be a "battle of blood."

Hudkins, "the Wildcat," walks about like a bully as though daring someone to knock an imaginary chip off his shoulder.

"I wish the fight was tonight," he said after his workout. "From now on my workouts will be very light as I am in the finest condition of my career."

The challenger looked the part. He weighed in at 153, the weight he expects to carry into the arena against Walker.

Judging from his ability to punch his sparring mates about the ring, one might be excused from expecting him to give the champion "the beating of his life" as Ace puts it.

Hudkins' reputation as a knockout artist was upheld in one of his exhibitions Monday when he knocked out Dixie Kid for 20 seconds.

Walker has moved about his camp, however, in an equally confident air and pooh-poohs the statement that he hears from the opposition. He has trained himself down within the middleweight requirement of 160 pounds and expects to weigh in at 155 on the afternoon of the battle.

The champion has concentrated his efforts the past two days to developing speed and footwork and has pleased both manager Jack Kearns and Trainer Teddy Hayes in this respect.

"Walker never looked better," Kearns said. "We are not worrying about the outcome."

Strangler Lewis Defeats Washburn

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 19. (UP)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, successfully defended his title here tonight by winning two straight falls over Jack Washburn, Chicago grappler.

Using his famous headlock with deadly perfection, the champion pinned the 217-pound Chicagoan to the mat after 48 minutes of grappling in the first fall and flattened him again with a "rabbit punch" within five minutes in the second fall.

The match was scheduled as a three-fall, no time limit affair.

Howard Cantonwine, former Iowa State football star, defeated Chief Jim Clinstock, Osage Indian from Tulsa, Okla., in a one-fall semi-final match.

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FLYING CLOUD LEADING RACE

ORICK, Calif., June 19. (UP)—Four leaders of the Redwood Empire Indian marathon pluckily maintained their advantages tonight and there had been very little variation in the distances that separated them during the past 24 hours.

"Flying Cloud" was still in front and he had managed to increase his lead over Melika from 17 to 22 miles. He was north of here and if he keeps up his gait should finish the 482-mile race from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Ore., late Wednesday or early Thursday.

"Mad Bull," a fellow tribesman of "Flying Cloud," won the event last year but suffered from chafed legs in the early stages of this race. His comeback has been one of the features of the race.

Only 11 of the 29 starters remained in the running tonight.
