Las Vegas Chief Resigns Because Of Boy's Death

LAS VEGAS, Nev., June 20. (UP) - Chief of Police Lake resigned today "to avoid embarrassment of city officials" after one of his deputies had shot and killed an 8-year-old boy in the automobile of a fleeing bootlegger suspect.

Henry Dendrich, police officer who fired the bullet that killed Sheridan Bradshaw, was reported to a serious condition in the county jail. He was suffering from recurrence of a World War gas illness.

Arrest of Lake, who was riding with Dendrich when the shooting occurred, on a charge of involuntary manslaughter, was expected.

Both officers declared that they ordered C. W. Bradshaw, father of the boy, to halt his machine, and that when he failed to heed the command, Dendrich opened fire.

Dendrich aimed at the tires of the fleeing car, but the police auto hit a bump and a bullet crashed through the rear glass, striking the boy in the head. Lake declared.

The shooting took place Saturday night and the boy died three hours later.

Authorities charged that the elder Bradshaw has been selling liquor to minors at dances. They said 10 gallons of whiskey and a case of beer were found in his car after the shooting.

Lake's resignation was accepted late today.
