She has been served with a court order restraining her from taking off for Europe or elsewhere from Curtis Field, she announced today on her arrival here with her new backer, Mrs. Anne Stillman, and Mrs. Stillman's daughter, the wife of H. P. Davison, Jr.

The injunction was obtained by her former backers, the Hollis Corporation, New York promoters, Miss Rasche said. She had planned to takeoff Thursday for Old Orchard, Me., on the first leg of a trans-Atlantic flight in the Bellanca monoplane recently acquired for her by Mrs. Stillman.
