

Cards, Pirates Lead National League Friday

The St. Louis Cardinals increased their lead in the National league Friday by taking another game from the Chicago Cubs. The score was 4 to 1 and the game was halted at the end of the sixth inning by rain.

Sherdel, keeping fairly close to the standard of good pitching set Thursday by the Cards, held the Cubs to seven hits and one run in the abbreviated game, while the St. Louis club played errorless baseball behind him.

Yale Defeats Harvard in Annual Race on Thames

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 22, (UP)—Yale triumphed over Harvard in decisive fashion in the annual varsity boat race rowed through the heavy mists of the Thames river here this afternoon.

Nine boat lengths separated a still strong, hard rowing Yale shell from the struggling Harvard crew at the finish line.

The teams got away on even terms, but by the time the shells had covered two miles of the four-mile course, Yale had forged ahead.

Through the third mile first a length, then two, and finally three lengths, measured the Yale lead. Harvard, in the final mile, made a valiant effort, but Yale was so far better a crew that it was able to gain steadily, with a strong, even stroke, which was rowed for a time above 40 and then dropped back to that figure.

In the final half mile Yale steadily increased its lead. Two hundred yards from the finish line six lengths separated the shells. As they crossed, Yale was nine lengths in the lead and Harvard was just a boat load of exhausted men, trying to pull on oars.

The official time was: Yale, 20 minutes 31.3-10ths seconds. Harvard, 20 minutes 56 seconds.

Bobby Jones Leading Golfers At Olympia Field, Chicago

OLYMPIA FIELDS, CHICAGO, June 22, (UP)—One minute, golden afternoon sunshine bathed the rolling vista of Olympia Fields in its radiance, birds sang in the sweeping elms above the 18th green and Bobby Jones sank a long putt for his par to take the lead in the national open golf championship.

The next, hurtling out of the thunder clouds from the east came the storm—rain splashed down upon the course in sheets. Trees bent double before the furious storm. The chances of Bobby's contenders who had yet to finish their second round were swept away. Thus even the elements took a hand in bringing the stocky Atlanta to the fore in his fight to win his third open title.

Jones leads all the rest, with an aggregate of 144. Bob shot par golf for a 71 today, marvelous recoveries on the inside nine offsetting a decided wildness from the tee.

3 Coast States Challenge other 45 to Golf Tourney

PORTLAND, June 22, (UP)—California, Oregon and Washington today challenged the other 45 states of the union to select an eight-man golf team to meet an octet of coast players in a golf match to be played at Braeburn, Mass., in connection with the national amateur championship this year.

The challenge was mailed to Melvin Traylor, Chicago, president of the United States Golf association. It was announced here by officials of the Pacific Northwest Golf association.

The coast team will be composed of Fay Coleman, Los Angeles; Johnny McHugh, San Francisco; Dr. O. F. Willing, Frank Delp, Rudie Wilhelm and Don Moe, Portland; H. Chandler Egan, Medford; and Bob Stein, Seattle.

The challenge said that any eight amateurs in the other 45 states might be chosen to oppose the coast aces, or that the Walker cup team might represent the east, south, middlewest and west.

It was suggested that a return match be played on the Pebble beach course, where the national amateur championships will be held in 1929.

fighter of the links, blond George Von Elm, demonstrate his worth brilliantly.

The Californian, battling against wind and water, shot a 72 to move up into a tie for second place with an aggregate of 146, two strokes behind Jones. Tied with Von Elm is Bill Leach, of Overbrook, Pa., who finished his second round with a 74 some time before the deluge.

Of the dark horses who pranced so proudly to the fore in the first round of the championship, only Henry Cluel, the youthful diminutive Italian-American from Connecticut, remained up with the leaders. Frank Hall, the East Lake pro, who shared the lead with Cluel when the second round started, and Leonard Schmutte, the young Hoosier pro, who was second Thursday, cracked early in the day.

They had no excuse in the way of weather conditions, for they were out early and early were eliminated.

Cluel failed to keep up the furious pace he set the field on Thursday, but he did negotiate a 77, which gave him an aggregate of 147, and put him in a tie for fourth place with Hagen and Willie MacFarlane.

The latter came smiling thru the favoring morning sunshine, straight as an arrow to the pins and seldom in trouble, to add a 74 to his 73 of yesterday.

Jones, Von Elm, Leach, Cluel, Hagen and MacFarlane are the men to watch as the field, reduced to those who had aggregates of 158 or better, swings into action Saturday for the final and deciding two rounds.

Some one of the contenders a bit farther back may come rushing up to snatch the coveted championship at the last moment, but it hardly seems likely that any golfer here can spot Bobby Jones half a dozen strokes, considering the form the Atlanta is displaying.

Tommy Armour, defending champion, is seven strokes behind Bobby, with 151.
