

Missions, Angels Slide Down Ladder in Pacific League

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26, (U.P.)—The San Francisco Missions were eliminated from the race for top position of the first half of the Pacific coast league season today and the Los Angeles Angels were almost shoved entirely out of the contest.

The San Francisco Seals, leading the Hollywood Stars by three games, beat the Angels, 10 to 3, and the Stars beat the Missions, 4 to 3.

Eight runs in the first four innings assured the Seals of victory, while the Stars scored once in the last of the ninth to break a three to three tie and kill the Missions' chances for the first half pennant.

Oakland made six runs in the fourth and fifth innings and beat Seattle 7 to 3. Sacramento and Portland each made four runs in the first inning, but the Senators scored once in the second inning to win, 5 to 4.

Brooklyn Robins Jump Two Places

The Brooklyn Robins came bounding out of the second division in the National league Tuesday, rising from fifth to third place.

Old Joe Harris, World War veteran and American league discard, delivered a timely double in the role of pinch-hitter in the ninth inning of the second game which enabled the Robins to make a clean sweep of a double-header with the Boston Braves, 5 to 1 and 6 to 5.

Splitting a double-header with the Pittsburgh Pirates, the Chicago Cubs dropped from third to fourth place to make room for the Robins. The Cincinnati Reds, who were idle, moved to fifth place.

Burling Grimes allowed the Cubs only three hits, the Pirates winning the opener, 1 to 0. A four-run rally in the sixth inning gave the Cubs a 7 to 3 victory in the second game.

Collecting 18 hits, the Giants beat the Phillies, 7 to 6, in the only other game played.

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Risko to Have Chance to Show Metal in Bout With G. Godfrey

NEW YORK, June 26, (U.P.)—Crouching before a black giant weighing 235 pounds and measuring 6 feet 4 1/2 inches in height, Johnny Risko of Cleveland will have a chance Wednesday night at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, to pound his way to hitherto unknown title fame and fortune.

Risko can establish himself as the outstanding heavyweight outside of champion and challenger by defeating George Godfrey, the sleepy-eyed Alabama Negro, in their 10-round bout.

A glance at Godfrey's record might lead one to believe that Risko is confronted with a well-nigh impossible task. Until Godfrey met Paulino Uzcudun in Los Angeles early this spring, the negro had won 18 consecutive battles by knockouts in 1927, but they were mostly unknown and setups. He stopped Jim Maloney in one round and Monte Munn in four after both fighters had lost heart as a result of earlier defeats.

Risko has conclusively proved that size, reputation and punch hold no terrors for him. Outweighed 40 pounds and conceding his opponent 6 inches in height and 5 1/2 inches in reach, Risko is going into the bout with the avowed purpose of bringing this huge black down in one heap on the white canvas.

The betting odds have shifted from 8 to 5 on Godfrey to even money within the last four days.

"Privilege and pillage are the gold dust of normalcy," he said. "The Wilson administration is a green spot bounded on one side by the Malheur mess and on the other by an oil tanker flying a pirate's flag."

"The last seven and a half years have been putrid beyond precedent. We make no charge—we follow the official record."

Bowers, a slight boyish figure, could hardly be seen above the microphones and flag decorations around the speakers' stand.

Boy David

He seemed so unlike the taller figures around him that he appeared as if the democratic party was sending forth its boy David to slay the republican Goliath.

Outlines Scandals

Bowers sketched in strong phrases the scandals involving the veterans' bureau, the department of justice, and the Teapot Dome oil cases.

"We have seen the money appropriated for the care of the sick and wounded soldiers squandered on the pleasures of a drunken libertine," he said. "We have seen the nation's oil reserves, set aside by the presence of Roosevelt, and sacredly guarded by the honesty and wisdom of Wilson and Daniels, bartered away by a member of the cabinet for a bribe in a little black bar."

Wilson Cheered

A mighty shout greeted Bowers' reference to Woodrow Wilson. Thousands were on their feet, cheering and waving their hats. But the demonstration lasted less than a minute and the crowd settled back again.

In 1924, when Senator Harrison, the key-note of Madison Square Garden, mentioned the name of Wilson a 20-minute demonstration was set off.

Accuses Republicans

Bowers devoted the major part of his keynote to rectifying episodes of alleged republican corruption.

While these passages were frequently cheered and listened to with interest, the first real spontaneous outburst greeted his demand "that the hand of privilege shall be taken out of the farm-throat."

Although the nomination of Gov. Smith is regarded by practically everyone present as inevitable, there was no mention

of his name and no reference to him.

Avoids Prohibition

Neither did Bowers deal with the disputed prohibition issue. He concentrated entirely upon carrying the fight to the enemy party. There was a reference to Hoover but without direct mention of his name in the following passage:

"When a warning of the impending crime (the leasing of Teapot Dome to Harry F. Sinclair) was sent to a member of the cabinet, but recently knighted by the golden wand, he sent the letter to Albert B. Fall with his notation: 'I would be glad to convey to this gentleman any reply you may suggest.'"

Bowers belabored administrative figures for their silence regarding the oil scandals.

"Imagine Andrew Jackson silent in the midst of such crimes," he said. "Imagine Tilden; imagine Cleveland; imagine Wilson! Why, they would have thundered their denunciations from the leftmost station in the world and have scourged the rascals forth with scorpion whips tipped with consuming flames."

Meeting Adjourned

At 9:24 p. m. the convention adjourned until 11 o'clock Wednesday morning.

The only event of the night session was the keynote speech of temporary chairman Bowers.

For some strange reason the democrats did not seem as demonstrative tonight as in other conventions. There was a dignity and restraint about the session unusual in democratic gatherings.

Chairman Bowers delivered his keynote address in graphic style and held the convention at a high pitch of interest yet except for the six minute outburst over the description of the farm belt the evening went off with only occasional bursts of handclapping and cheering.

The platform committee, it was announced, will settle down to work Wednesday. After the adjournment the delegates drifted back toward their hotels to mill in the crowded lobbies or to amuse themselves as best they could. Interest in the nomination and in the prohibition fight had tapered off considerably since the outcome in both cases is felt so definitely known.

American Tennis Players Advance To Third Round

WIMBLEDON, England, June 26, (U.P.)—William T. Tilden, II, and George Lott of the United States Davis cup team advanced to the third round of the All-England championships today by winning their second round matches in straight sets in the men's singles.

Rain interfered with the progress of the tournament, preventing John Hennessey and Wilbur F. Coen, Jr., the other two United States Davis cup players, from participating in their second round matches.

The second round had its terror for the French Davis cup team members, who played unbelievably poor tennis. Rene Lacoste defeated the Australian Davis cup player, J. R. Hawkes, 6-3, 4-6, 6-3, 6-14, but was badly off his game. Lacoste had difficulty in solving Hawkes' spinning underhand shots.

Henri Cochet eliminated Harry Hopman, Australian Davis cup player, 6-1, 6-4, 8-6, but showed nothing to indicate he is the same player who won the championship last year. Hopman's volleying was frequently superior and his sizzling drives and generalship repeatedly bothered Cochet.

Jean Borotra had a narrow call with G. P. Hughes, the Englishman, but finally won out, 1-6, 6-4, 6-3, 8-6.

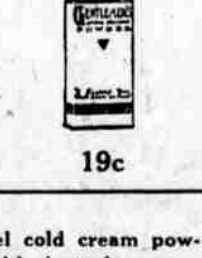
