

Risko Wins Bout From 235 Lb. Colored Giant in New York

BROOKLYN, N. Y., June 27. (UP)—Outweighed nearly 45 pounds and conceding his opponent six inches in height, Johnny Risko, of Cleveland, staged a sensational comeback in the late rounds to win the judges' decision over George Godfrey, in a 10 round bout before 20,000 spectators here tonight.

Unable to get inside the big negro's long arms in the early rounds, Risko kept everlastingly after Godfrey until he began to pound his punches past the negro's defense.

Risko scored heavily with his left in the late rounds, making Godfrey blink his eyes and clinch every time he saw the blow coming.

Godfrey piled up a good lead in the early rounds, driving Risko around the ring with a whirlwind body attack. But he slowed down after the fifth round, and for the rest of the fight, clinched and clawed at Risko, who looked like a pygmy in comparison to the black giant.

There were no knockdowns, although Godfrey used his superior weight and strength to wrestle Risko around and several times in a clinch almost tossed the smaller boxer to the canvas.

Godfrey unleashed his best guns at Risko in the fourth and fifth rounds, jarring the Cleveland boy considerably.

But Godfrey never had the rubbery ex-baker in distress.

To the contrary, Risko had Godfrey backing up and clinching in the last three rounds when the tide of battle began to swing from the black to the white man.

Risko fought like a wild man in the eighth, ninth and tenth rounds, winning all three of them with room to spare. The Cleveland boxer's fierce body punches made Godfrey wince and cover up repeatedly in the ninth round.

For a time early in the fight, it looked as if the bullet-headed negro would establish his claim to the cognomen of "black menace" and brush Risko aside in his climb up the heavyweight ladder, but Godfrey weakened perceptibly under Risko's punishing body blows, which filled the air in the late rounds.

Godfrey towered way above Risko so that it was almost impossible for the smaller man to reach Godfrey's head.

He tried hard to reach Godfrey's jaw in the early rounds, but switched his attack to the body when he had trouble hitting the higher target. It was this change which won the fight for him.

Jimmy Evans Wins From J. Priston

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27. (UP)—Jimmy Evans, welterweight from the Pacific northwest, defeated Johnny Priston of Honolulu in a 10-round bout here tonight. Priston knocked Evans down twice for nine counts, once in the first round and again in the third, but could not hold the advantage.

Molla Mallory Eliminated in Women's Singles

WIMBLETON, England, June 27. (UP)—A near repetition of Francis T. Hunter's defeat in the first round of the men's singles took place in the women's singles today when Mrs. Molla Mallory, veteran United States star, was eliminated from the All-England championships by Miss L. Bickerton, youthful Australian player, 6-3, 1-6, 6-1.

The match was started yesterday, but was halted by the rain after Miss Hickerton had won the first set. Mrs. Mallory was out-speeded and outgeneralized by her younger opponent but her defeat was largely due to her own ragged play.

The other four U. S. representatives in the women's singles—Helen Wills, Helen Jacobs, E. Ryan and Penelope Anderson—won their first matches without the loss of a set. Miss Wills, defending champion, beat the English hardcourt champion, Elsie Goldsack, 6-2, 6-1, in a second round match, having drawn a bye in the first round. The Berkeley girl next will play Miss V. Gallay of France.

All postponed matches were played off in the men's singles, narrowing the field down to 32 players, of which five are Americans, William T. Tilden, II, G. Lott, John Hennessey, Wilbur F. Coen, Jr., and Sidney R. Wood, the first four named members of the U. S. Davis Cup team.
