

Yankees Lengthen Lead in American League to Twelve

The New York Yankees lengthened their lead in the American league to 12 games Thursday by beating the Athletics 10 to 4. Babe Ruth hit his 29th and 30th home runs of the season, putting him 15 days ahead of his 1927 schedule.
The St. Louis Cardinals maintained their 4 1/2 game lead in the National league by defeating the Pirates 4 to 3. Hafey's home run in the seventh was the deciding factor.
The Giants kept pace with the Cardinals by beating the Phillies 7 to 1.
Defeating the Detroit Tigers 2 to 2, the St. Louis Browns moved within two games of the second place Athletics in the American league. Sam Gray allowed nine hits.
The Boston Red Sox beat the Senators 8 to 7, after losing the first game 4 to 3.
Scoring a run in the last of the ninth the Chicago White Sox won from the Cleveland Indians, 3 to 2.
No other games were played.

Democrats Adopt Bone Dry Plank

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ed by a democratic convention. To please the wets, it carried the phrase "an honest effort to enforce." The wets say it can not be enforced. To please the dries, it mentioned the eighteenth amendment, just as the republican platform did at Kansas City.
Behind this brief, but terse expression in the middle of the platform, the resolutions committee built up a declaration of principles in which agricultural relief occupied the most space.
The farm plank charged the republican party with practicing deception upon the agricultural interests. It condemned President Coolidge for vetoing the McNary-Haugen bill and failing to offer anything in its stead.
As the democratic program, it pledged support to legislation "for the control and orderly handling of agricultural surpluses in order that the price of the surplus may not determine the price of the whole crop." This was the theory of the McNary-Haugen bill, but the bill itself was not mentioned by name.
The remedy for agricultural ills must be found in one of the four following things, the platform committee told the convention:
1. Credit loans by the government to co-operatives on a basis similar to government aid for the merchant marine.
2. Creation of a federal reserve board such as has been done for the banker and business man.
3. Reduction of the spread between the price the farmer sells for and the price the consumer pays, aimed apparently to reduce the profits of the middlemen and the cost of transportation.
4. Consideration of agricultural conditions in formulation of government financial and tax measures.
The first plank in the platform was a declaration for state's rights, cherished by southern leaders and used by northern wets as a basis of attack upon the eighteenth amendment.
The second plank, headed "republican corruption," sounded the keynote of the platform.
It described agriculture as prostrate, American shipping as destroyed, workmen without employment and "everywhere disgust and suspicion, and corruption unpunished and aided."
"Sordid corruption and unabashed rascality," "compounded frauds," "shocking thievery," and "startling depravities," were some of the terms used in this plank.
"The watchword of the day should be: 'turn the rascals out,'" the plank stated, borrowing a phrase from Andrew Jackson and the Senator James A. Reed campaign.
"To this end, every minor difference on non-essential issues should be put aside and a determined and a united fight be made to rescue government from those who have betrayed their trust by disgracing it," the corruption plank concluded.
The platform promised stringent economy in government by business like re-organization of the departments; elimination of waste and substitution of business like methods, "for existing obsolete and antiquated conditions."
The finance and taxation plank promised retirement of the public debt within reasonable time and denounced the policy of levy-

As if to warn the United States of the tremendous task it faces in attempting to wrest the Davis Cup from France, seven Frenchmen gained places in the last 17 of the men's singles.
Only Hennessey, who beat G. R. Sherwell of England, 6-4, 7-5, 6-2, and Tilden, who beat Baron de Kehrung of Hungary, 6-2, 6-3, 6-1, remains to stem the conquering Gauls.

Charles Curtis Born Catholic

ST. MARYS, Kas., June 28. (AP)—The baptismal record of the immaculate conception Catholic church here shows that Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas, republican vice presidential nominee was baptized in the church April 15, 1860, by Father L. Demortier, a Jesuit priest.
Senator Curtis now is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church in Topeka, Kansas.
The baptismal record, written in Latin, says:
"This 15th day of April, 1860, I have solemnly baptized Charles Curtis, the legitimate son of William Curtis and Ellen Papin, born on the 25th of January, 1860, sponsors, Henry Papin and Suzanne Papin.
(Signed) "L. Demortier, S. J."
Kansas historical works give the name of Senator Curtis' father as Orren or Orrin A. Curtis, instead of William as in the baptismal record.
