NEW YORK, June 30. (UP)—"Goose" Goslin, leftfielder of the Washington Senators, is blazing the trail for all major league batters with an average of .438. No other player in either league is batting .400. Goslin's closest American league rival is young Jimmy Foxx of the Philadelphia Athletics, who is batting .369.

Rogers Hornsby's duties as manager of the Boston Braves have not detracted from his batting ability and the Rajah is showing the way to National league batters with an average of .399.

Paul Waner of the Pittsburgh Pirates, who led the National league in batting last year with an average of .380, is in second place with a mark of .370.
