Growth of Davis Furniture House Declared Unusual

Indelibly linked with the growth and progress of Klamath Falls is the business romance which has to do with Claud Davis, local furniture dealer, and his wife and business partner, Ethel Davis.

It has been a story of progress: a story of hard work, of defeats and failures, and now of smiles and business success.

It was four years ago that Mr. Davis went into business for himself after disposing of his interests in the Mordoff, Woolf and Davis furniture store at the location recently vacated by the Mordoff Furniture company.

And now after four years, Mr. and Mrs. Davis are moving back into the store they left, with one of the largest stocks of furniture in southern Oregon.

Mr. Davis some years ago was in partnership with J. J. Johnson. The latter sold out his interests to Mordoff and Woolf, with whom Mr. Davis then became associated. He left this firm in June, 1924, and with his wife, opened up a small store at 114 South Seventh street. At that time they carried only a small stock of rugs, linoleum and window shades. But business prospered with these optimists, for they had faith in the community. In September of that same year they moved into a store building in the McCarthy building, where they added a small stock of furniture. Then during the succeeding four years they have added steadily to their stock, and their growth has been remarkable.

It was only recently they purchased the entire stock of the Mordoff furniture house and now are moving into that store building.

It was a hard fight they made during the first year or two they branched out for themselves. But perseverance won, and now they have six employees in addition to themselves.

In their new store they are even now planning numerous changes and enlargements.

Such is the business romance of Claud and Ethel Davis. It is a romance that has to do with the remarkable growth of this Klamath country and the faith that has found its just reward.

New Restaurant On Main Street Opens Formally

This noon The Pelican Grille, acknowledged to be the finest and most modern in southern Oregon will open its doors to the public under the ownership of Jack Herabberger, experienced restaurant man who has taken a ten year lease on the location on Main between Seventh and Eighth streets.

With the opening of the grille Mr. Herabberger expects to give to the people of southern Oregon the most modern and well equipped eating place possible.

Several thousand dollars has been spent during the past few weeks in preparing the place for opening, with the installation of an entire new kitchen, including electric broiling machines, toasters, dish washing and dish drying machines. Another added feature to the kitchen department is the cold storage plant taking in a space of 15x20 feet.

Along the front entrance of the grille an enlarged counter of beautiful oak carried out in the soft grey tones has been installed. The counter is 45 feet in length with a cold storage system installed along the walls. To the back of the grille 12 good sized booths which will accommodate close to 50 guests were being installed this morning. In the center floor space to the back large tables are being placed, so that more than 125 people can be taken care of at one time.

A banquet room for special parties is being refurbished in the basement.

For more than seven years Mr. Herabberger has been actively and successfully engaged in the cafe business in this city. He was first located in the Rex Cafe and for the past four and one-half years owned The Club on Main and Sixth which closed with the opening of the new grille by Mr. Herabberger.

"I had hoped we would be able to open yesterday, but since a number of our electrical fixtures are not quite fully installed I feel it is better to open Sunday noon," Mr. Herabberger stated. "It will be our aim to give the best service possible in the future just as we have in the past."

"Honest John," who in reality is the leader of a band of outlaws, is a most convincing "bad man" and peeps up the picture in no small degree.

Last of all is "Silver King," surely a star of ranking equine performers, and the beautiful horse plays no small part in the success of the picture.
