

Balloon Trophy Won By U. S. in Race; Germany Takes Second

WASHINGTON, July 6, (UP)—The United States gained permanent possession of the Gordon-Bennett international balloon trophy today when the U. S. army balloon piloted by Captain W. E. Kepner was declared official winner of the last race which started in Detroit June 30.

Capt. Kepner's balloon made a total distance of 460.9 miles from Detroit, the starting point, landing three miles from Kenbridge, Va.

Second place was awarded to the German balloonist, Hugo Kaules, Sr., with a total distance of 459.4 miles. The French balloonist, Charles Dollfus, was given third place by his flight of 447.9 miles.

Eighteen-Year-Old Youngster Defeats Veterans in Tryouts

HARVARD STADIUM, CAMBRIDGE, Mass., July 6, (UP)—A blonde-tipped flash through the fading twilight in Harvard stadium, Frank Wykoff, a California school boy, showed the way to America's veterans of the cinder path in the finals of the greatest sprint series ever contested.

Moving up with every stride as the final sextet in the Olympic 100-metres dash tore down the straightaway into the vast chasm of cheers at the finish, the 18-year-old youngster from Glendale high school flung his powerful body against the tape a full yard ahead of the pack.

Behind him, straining every stride for the places with meager chance to represent the United States on the running track at Amsterdam, five other finalists in this most dramatic of sprints finished as one man.

When the judges had sorted them out, literally counting by noses, it was found that Bob McAlister, the New York veteran, once known as the "flying cop" and a former metropolitan sprint champion, had placed second, with Henry Russell, the tall Cornell runner, third, and Claude Hracey, the Rice Institute flyer, fourth.

Wykoff's victory in the 100-metre dash marked the completion of the Olympic sprint tryouts.

Simultaneous with the school boy's triumph came the passing of Olympic heroes of the past decade, Charley Paddock, once called the "fastest human," who was last in his semi-final heat, Frank Hussey, who won Olympic fame as a school boy himself in 1924, and Jackson V. Scholz, the only American winner of a flat race at Paris four years ago, who was shut out in that desperate driving finish in which Wykoff was crowned the country's spring king.

The far west's representatives showed to advantage in other trials held this afternoon, the finals of which were reserved for tomorrow.

Ross Nichols of Stanford equalled the world's record of 14.4 seconds in winning his semi-final heat in the 110-meter high hurdles. Bud Houser of the Los Angeles A. C. hurled the discus beyond the best efforts of his competitors in the trials of this event. "Sandy" Irix of Washington showed the boys a few tricks with the 16-pound shot.

In every event the Olympic selections committee was forced to turn its eyes speculatively westward in summing up the athletic strength of the nation.

The south, too, gave promise of placing a number of sterling athletes aboard the President Roosevelt when that vessel sails for Amsterdam next Wednesday. Young Eddie Hamm, the Georgia Tech broad jumper, leaped a full foot farther than the rest in leading the qualifiers in his specialty.

The New York Giants made 16 hits and beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 11 to 7. The Pirates made 15 hits off Joe Genewich and Lefty Paulkner, scoring four runs in the ninth inning.

As the St. Louis Cardinals were idle, the Giants' victory reduced the Cardinals' lead to three games.

Led by Hack Wilson, who hit his 20th and 21st home runs of the season, the Chicago Cubs pounded out 20 hits off Petty, Moss and Koufal, beating the Brooklyn Robins 14 to 8. The Robins made 19 hits off Percy Lee Jones, the millionaire southpaw.

The Cubs went into a tie with the Cincinnati Reds for third place as a result of the victory.

White Sox Clean Washington Club

A four-run rally in the ninth fell one run short of tying the score and the Washington Senators lost to the Chicago White Sox, 9 to 8, in the only American League game. Ted Lyons stopped the Washington rally.

The White Sox made seven runs in the fifth inning, driving Milton Gaston out of the box.
