

Sensational Performance Put On By Men Picked For Olympiad

HARVARD STADIUM, Cambridge, Mass., July 7. (UP)—Amidst a crash of records, America's full Olympic strength for the forthcoming Olympic games was demonstrated dramatically this afternoon in Harvard stadium before 30,000 spectators and vociferous as one sensational performance followed another.

Two world records and a score of American and national championship marks were shattered in the blazing sunshine of a day made perfect for track and field achievement.

Certain winners at Amsterdam head the list of athletes who survived the final tests and were named tonight by the selections committee to wear the starry shield of the United States in the 1928 Olympic games.

In addition to the constant breaking of records, the thrills in Harvard stadium were thrown to the spectators of brilliant comebacks by famous American track stars, veterans of previous Olympiads who recovered defeats sustained at the hands and feet of the youngsters on Friday by swinging into the winning column today.

The outstanding performers of the afternoon were Edward Hamm, the bronzed young collegian from Georgia Tech, who set a new world's mark in the broad jump, and Lloyd Hahn, the temperamental Nebraskan who sports the golden unicorn of the B. A. A.

With plenty to spare at the finish of the 500 meters run, Hahn broke the world's record, set by D. Otto Pelzer of Germany two years ago, winning the finals in his specialty in 1:51.3-5. Earl Fuller was second and Roy Watson third.

Hamm, of Georgia Tech, picked himself up at the takeoff and

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GERMAN ACES BREAK RECORD

DESSAU, Germany, July 7. (UP)—Johann Ritzke and Wilhelm Zimmerman, crack Junkers pilots, landed here today after remaining in the air for 45 hours, 26 minutes and shattering all endurance flight records.

The fliers' wives were waiting for them, along with 10,000 other people who had waited for hours to greet them. With a cheer, the crowd broke through the protective cordon around the plane and almost smothered the record breakers in their efforts to congratulate them.

Ritzke—former holder of the endurance record—and Zimmerman ascended at 4:04 a. m. Thursday and began a monotonous patrol back and forth between Dessau and Leipzig. Occasionally they dropped messages saying all was well.

The plane functioned perfectly. Earlier this week it had failed, after 17 hours, on a similar attempt.

In making the record, the two had to exceed by one hour the time made several weeks ago by Major Arturo Ferrarin and Major Carlo Del Prete, Italian Royal Air force fliers, now in Brazil after a flight from Rome.

For a day Ferrarin and Del Prete were holders both of the long distance and endurance records. The long distance record they still hold by virtue of their flight to Brazil that ended on the beach at Santos Thursday night.

YANKEES TAKE TWO GAMES

Lou Gehrig and Babe Ruth didn't hit any home runs Saturday, but they crossed the plate with two timely runs which made it possible for the New York Yankees to defeat the St. Louis Browns twice by one run, 5 to 4 and 1 to 0.

George Pipparas received credit for winning his 15th victory of the season, the first major league pitcher to attain that mark.

The Philadelphia Athletics divided a double-header with the Cleveland Indians. In the first game the Indians won, 2 to 1. Home runs by Bing Miller and Mickey Cochrane helped the Athletics win the second game, 6 to 2.

Garland Braxton allowed the Chicago White Sox only three hits and the Washington Senators won, 9 to 1.

The Detroit Tigers jarred the Boston Red Sox for a double defeat, 20 to 3 and 4 to 3, and as a result moved within three points of the Red Sox in seventh place. The second game went 13 innings.

Six successive hits off Larry Benton in the sixth inning scored five runs and the Pirates beat the Giants, 3 to 0, in the first game.

Fred Fitzsimmons was wild and Andy Cohen made a costly error, the Pirates winning the second game 5 to 2.

Prior to Saturday, the Pirates hit off Haines and Frankhouse had dropped five games in a row. The Boston Braves made 17 hits off Haines and Frankhouse and beat the league leading St. Louis Cardinals 11 to 3.

The Cincinnati Reds gained ground on the Cardinals and Giants by beating the Phillies, 6 to 5, on five hits.

After defeating the Cubs 5 to 3, the Brooklyn Robins lost the second game, 6 to 2. Hack Wilson hit home run No. 22 in the second game and Blanton hit home run No. 17 in the first game.

Helen Wills Now World Champion

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 7. (UP)—Miss Helen Wills of Berkeley, Calif., extended her tennis supremacy to the whole world today when she defeated Senorita Lili De Alvarez of Spain for the second straight year in the women's singles final of the all-England tennis championships.

Before a brilliant gathering of 17,000 spectators, including the king and queen of England, Miss Wills conquered the Spanish girl in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3, and now holds the English, French and American women's singles championships.

The United States shared with South Africa the victory of Elizabeth Ryan, California veteran, and P. D. B. Spence over Pat Crawford and Daphne Akhurst of Australia in the mixed doubles. The scores were 7-5, 6-4.

France won the men's doubles title, Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon succeeding William T. Tilden and Francis T. Hunter, last year's champions, by defeating Gerald Patterson, and J. B. Hawkes, the Australian conquerors of Tilden and Hunter in the semi-finals. The scores were 13-11, 6-4, 6-4.

California Defeats Yale in Tryouts for Olympic Honors

PHILADELPHIA, July 7. (UP)—The University of California crew defeated Yale university today for the right to represent the United States in the eight-oared event at the Olympic games in Amsterdam.

The Golden Bears led from the half-mile mark and inch by inch crept into a half-length lead at the finish line of the 2000 meters. Yale made a courageous challenge at the finish. The time was 5 minutes, 46 seconds.

The California eight, Pacific Coast champions, came east to win from the best of the intercollegiate crews at Poughkeepsie. Then they came to train on the Schuylkill for the Olympics. In each trial race California swept to victory.

One of the largest crowds ever to see a regatta here—25,000 persons—cheered when the westerners won from the conquerors of Harvard on the Thames last month. Harvard, the only other college
