## Home Decorations

Query: What can I do to repaint my old window shades?

Answer: Lay the shade on a table, scour with soft soap and water, followed with a wash of clear water. When perfectly dry apply a washable wall finish, thinned with pure turpentine. Use a four-inch brush. Two thin coats will be found better than one thick one. This paint has for its base lithophone, which is the product used by all manufacturers of window shades.

Query: What should I hang over my mantle? Which is best, a picture or a plaque?

Answer: Everything depends on the style of your fireplace. Some demand nothing at all, others a very formal treatment such as a large mirror in a rich frame or a wonderful tapestry in rich colors, or a large rare picture in a good frame. A simple fireplace should be treated carefully and the amateur decorator will find it safest to err on the side of simplicity. Pictures, plaques, tapestries, mirrors, are all good in the right place.

Query: What colors are best to combine with mulberry?

Answer: Gold, both bright and antique, small touches of brilliant black, and good greens.

Query: What materials do you recommend for upholstering a chair. We need a good serviceable material which is not too expensive.

Answer: One of the heavy mohairs. They have wonderful wearing qualities, are inexpensive and do not fade.

Query: Is it necessary to use an undercoat before applying enamel to new wood? MRS. R. S. Answer: Yes, always, and furthermore be sure it is dry before the enamel is applied, otherwise the enamel will crack.

Query: What is the origin of the niches which are being built into so many houses today?

Answer: These niches originated probably in the churches of southern Europe as suitable places for the pieces of statuary which are found in such churches and cathedrals. This idea was carried out in private homes of Spain and Italy.

Query: We need some kind of a radiator shield. What do you recommend? MRS. T. E.

Answer: The metal ones, by all means, as they withstand the heat best. These shields protect the walls and provide a very convenient shelf for pottery.

## Books of Today

### THAT BRIGHT HEAT

By George O'Neill

Mr. George O'Neill, a contemporary American poet of definite good repute, here gives us his first novel. It is in many ways successful, its few faults being of less importance than its good qualities. Mr. O'Neill takes us back to the vivacious 1870's in St. Louis, to the time of a nation's confident expansion and of a city's gay exuberance. We enjoy the background to the action of his novel; it has at the sure detail of authentic historical narrative, and it set us amid a brave civilization that we are only too likely to forget. As his two central characters Mr. O'Neill gives us a poetical young man, world-weary and savagely introspective, and a young woman who returns to St. Louis after a European education, genuinely sophisticated and yet ingenuously honest. Love plays between them and almost brings them to an enduring happiness. But a melodramatic catastrophe (and here Mr. O'Neill sins egregiously) separates them beyond the possibility of reunion.

We wish that character working upon character rather than an accumulation of irrationally associated events had brought about the final tragedy of the novel. But a first novel seldom comes to complete success, and this particular one will be remembered for its flavor of old St. Louis and for its sharply drawn character long after its flaws in construction have been forgotten. Mr. O'Neill by virtue of "That Bright Heat," is now to be respected as a novelist.
