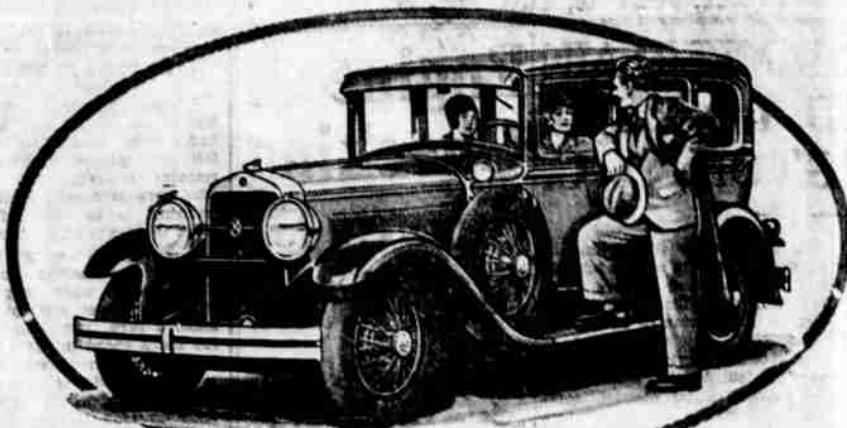
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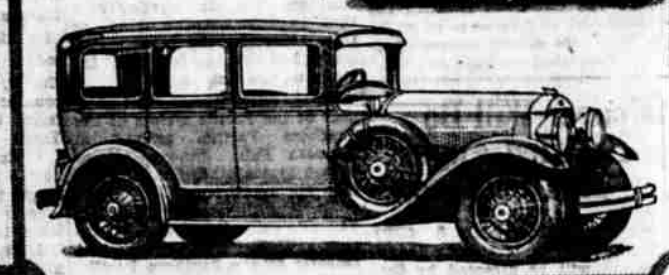
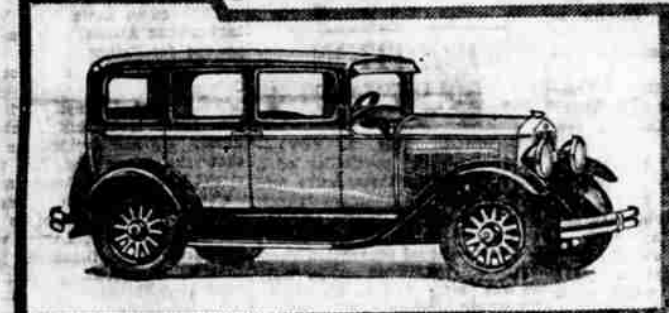

Charley Paddock Cleared of
Charges of Professionalism

NEW YORK, July 9. (UP)—Charley Paddock of Los Angeles, veteran sprinter of the 1920 and 1924 Olympic teams, was cleared of all charges of professionalism today by Daniel J. Ferris, chairman of the national registration committee of the Amateur Athletic union, and will sail aboard the S. S. Roosevelt Wednesday as a member of the 1928 Olympic team.

New charges brought against Paddock by several members of the National A. A. U. track and field committee and the Olympic selection committee failed to materialize today and Ferris accepted the certification of the Southern Pacific association of the A. A. U., which passed on Paddock's eligibility June 12.

Only Chairman Ferris and Robert S. Weaver, president of the Southern Pacific association, attended the meeting today, and the bitter fight which had been predicted against Paddock's amateur standing was nowhere to be seen.

Paddock came out of the meeting smiling, signed an affidavit to the effect he has not at any

time received any remunerations either directly or indirectly in the making of a motion picture known as "The Olympic Hero," or for his personal appearance in connection with the picture's exhibition, and told newspapermen.

"I am happy to be exonerated of these charges which have been making their appearances almost continuously during the past few weeks, and I will now give my greatest efforts to win for my country at Amsterdam."

Strange as it may seem, Paddock is now a member of the 1928 Olympic team and will compete for the United States at Amsterdam despite the fact that the National A. A. U. track and field committee voted 5 to 3 against selecting him for the Olympic team and that the Olympic selection committee voted 8 to 1 against him on the same question.

The grounds upon which these two committees based their negative vote at Boston Saturday night after Paddock had won the right to be selected by finishing second to Charley Borah in the 200 meters, it was charged today, were personal prejudice and animosity to an individual.

But for the threat of Robert S. Weaver to withdraw the 12 members of the Los Angeles A. C. who qualified for the Olympic team, the two committees might have barred Paddock without giving him a hearing.

According to Weaver, a member of one of the committees wanted to bar Paddock because he wore blue and white striped running pants.

"Any athlete who wears blue and white running pants ought not to be allowed to represent his country," Weaver quoted one committeeman as saying at Boston.

Dave Shade Too
Much for Colima

CHICAGO, July 9. (UP)—Dave Shade, California middleweight, knocked out Bert Colima, also of California, in the seventh round of a scheduled ten-round bout here tonight.

Shade had the better of the mulling throughout the entire bout and knocked Colima down for a two count in the sixth. In the early part of the seventh session he floored the Mexican for a count of seven. Colima was still groggy when he regained his feet and Shade measured him for the knockout.

Shade had the weight advantage, weighing 159½ to Colima's 155. He used the extra poundage to good advantage in the clinches and had little trouble outclassing the Mexican, who favored either at long range or in fighting.

Colima was unable to solve his opponent's crouching, shifting attack and had little success in imitating Shade's style, being cast in the role of catcher all the way through the fight.

Tonight's bout was Shade's fifth appearance in Chicago and he maintained his record of winning every start.
