

Athletes Head For Europe on Floating Gym

ABOARD S. S. PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT, July 11.—Loaded to the gunwales with the best of America's amateur athletic talent, this floating gymnasium is pushing through the Atlantic, carrying the greatest "army of invasion" since the World War.

When the President Roosevelt shows its nose up the Amstel river at Amsterdam, July 20, the greatest Olympic team the United States has ever sent abroad will disembark to stretch its exceedingly valuable legs.

There will be nine days left in which the runners can get back their land legs in preparation for the start of the Olympiad on July 29. Swimmers, wrestlers, boxers and weight men should be in comparatively good shape when they land, for a special tank, a boxing ring, and a miniature field have been rigged up on deck.

Thursday the athletes will take light exercise, and thereafter will increase the amount daily as they accustom themselves to the roll of the ship. The President Roosevelt will be the only home they will have for the next few weeks, for all the American entrants will be quartered on the ship during the games. They will be ferried to the stadium daily in a large launch.

How Much Water Should Baby Get?—A Family Authority's Rule

Baby specialists agree nowadays that during the first six months, babies must have three ounces of fluid per pound of body weight daily. An eight pound baby, for instance, needs twenty-four ounces of fluid. Later on the rule is two ounces of fluid per pound of body weight. Senators, Stars Tied for Honors In Coast League

SAN FRANCISCO, July 11. (U. P.)—Sacramento and Hollywood Martin bout for the junior lightweight championship of the world was postponed tonight because of rain and will be held Friday, July 13.

The four-cornered tie for top place was broken when the Senators defeated the San Francisco Seals by a score of 3 to 2 in a 15-inning contest, and the Hollywood Stars moved Seattle into second place by winning 5 to 2 from the Indians.

Oakland paraded around Los Angeles for a total of 20 runs to one lone tally for the Angels, while Misalious won from Portland 9 to 4.

After Sacramento had taken a one-run lead in the third inning, the Seals put across a tally in the eighth to even the count one up, and there was no more scoring until the 11th, when each team made one run. The contest waged until the 15th, when the Senators brought in the winning score.

Hollywood scored in the first, fourth, sixth and eighth to defeat Seattle. Seattle's scores were made in the fourth and seventh periods.

Oakland moved into a tie for third place in the circuit by swamping the Los Angeles Angels. The result was not in doubt after the fourth inning, when the Oaks players hammered the Angels for 13 runs. Twenty-two hits were made by Oakland batsmen.

The San Francisco Missions also were resting in third place tonight as a result of their victory over the Portland Beavers. Taking a three-run lead in the first inning, the Missions were on the top side during the entire contest.
