

SIX MEN SAVED FROM ICY DEATH

Disorder Prevails In Prohibition Meeting

Barney Selected as Presidential Choice; Factions Declare for Hoover and Smith

CHICAGO, July 12 (UP)—Following several scenes of the wildest disorder, which threatened at a time to disrupt the convention, William F. Barney, Rockville, Center, R. I., was selected as the presidential nominee of the prohibition party here late today.

A revolt, led by J. B. Hammond of Des Moines, Ia., earlier in the afternoon was followed by a second turmoil on the convention floor when balloting for the nominee began and Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York, "wet" democratic presidential candidate was placed in nomination. Smith received two votes on the first ballot.

James A. Edgerton, Alexandria, Va., a "southern democrat," was nominated for the vice president.

FLYING PLANS TALKED OVER

A second meeting will be held in the near future, it was announced.

Nine Killed in German Accident

BERLIN, July 12, (UP)—Nine persons were killed and 28 were seriously injured tonight when a passenger train was wrecked in the Hartz mountains near Nordhausen.

The train was crowded with parents of school children who were in the second car and suffered the most casualties.

Nordhausen is a town of about 28,000 population in Prussian Saxony.

Raskob Goes About Work Of Electing Alfred Smith

NEW YORK, July 12, (UP)—John J. Raskob today went about his business of electing Alfred E. Smith president of the United States.

Unmindful of the speculation which followed his selection as chairman of the democratic national committee, Raskob turned his attention to the creation of a national organization, the raising of \$2,000,000 which Col. Herbert H. Lehman indicated would be necessary, the mapping of campaign strategy, and the selection of at least ten "key" cities where Governor Smith will speak.

With Raskob the campaign which will be climaxed next November is a business proposition, to be dispatched with the same efficiency and generalship which brought him power in the financial world.

RED BLUFF, Calif., July 12, (UP)—Two children were killed near here late today when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by a Southern Pacific limited train.

The victims were Violet Judish, 8, and her brother Wesley, 5.

The boy and girl were in the automobile of their grandfather, Gus Jans, who jumped from the machine and escaped.

Jans said the motor stalled just as he was on Tyler crossing, four miles south of here. The machine was hit by the Cascade limited.

Germany Ready To Sign Pact At Once

State Department Makes Public Text of Reply to Renunciation of War Treaty.

WASHINGTON, July 12, (UP)—Germany has accepted without reservation the American draft for the renunciation of war treaty, and is "ready to sign the pact in the form now proposed," the state department announced tonight in making public the text of the German reply.

The German note, transmitted to American Ambassador Schurman in Berlin by Heinrich von Schubert, secretary of state for the ministry of foreign affairs, follows:

"I acknowledge the receipt of your excellency's note of June 23, 1928, regarding the conclusion of an international pact for the renunciation of war, and have the honor to reply thereto as follows on behalf of the German government:

THEO. JACKSON HELD INNOCENT

PORTLAND, July 12, (UP)—It took a jury in federal court just five minutes to decide this afternoon that Theodore Jackson, Klamath Indian, was not guilty of assault with intent to kill upon the person of Jasper Turner Jackson, another Indian.

Jasper Jackson, died after a fight with Theodore Jackson. The coroner of Klamath county held that the death was due to acute alcoholism but the government contended that it was from the beating Theodore Jackson was alleged to have administered to Jasper.

The jury took only enough time to sign and return the verdict.

SMOKING GREY WASTE SOLE REMAINDER OF EWAUNA'S MILL YARD

Last night a few faint spirals of smoke ascended over the acres of grey waste that the day before was yard No. 1 of the Ewauna Box company.

In the space of a few hours, a spark from the burner, a carelessly dropped cigarette, or the back-fire spark from a lumber "jitney" started the conflagration that wiped out, at a conservative estimate, \$250,000 worth of lumber and endangered the industrial section of Klamath Falls for hours.

It was a lucky fire, all agreed, in so far as any fire which destroys property can be called "lucky."

Work of reconstructing tramways and clearing away debris had already begun yesterday.

Within a few days the big sawmill, the planing mill, the box factory and the woods camps, employing in all some 600 men, will be running again. Only one

tramway and a log dump must be reconstructed.

Pile bottoms and other trams must be built, but only one and the log dump are holding up operations, it is said.

To the hundreds of persons who crowded into the Ewauna yards the sight of the fire, packed the high spots of Klamath Falls and lined the viaduct of the Southern Pacific company. It is an almost incredible sight to look out across the industrial district and see it, with the exception of the grey waste which was yard No. 1, intact.

A well-known insurance adjuster, seeing a News reporter scurrying about the lumber yard shortly after the fire started, called out "You might as well go home and wait till tomorrow morning. There'll be plenty to write then. . . . This won't get good for five or six hours. . . . (Continued on Page Five)

Voices From Far Places Heard in Religious Meet

LOS ANGELES, July 12, (UP)—Voices from the dark spots of the world cried today to Christendom for help today as natives from the Orient and from Africa brought their messages to the World's Sunday School convention.

A Moro chieftain from the Philippine island and a girl, one generation removed from cannibalism in Africa, told the 7,000 persons gathered from all parts of the two hemispheres that their people looked to Christian nations for leadership and guidance.

Matias Cuadara told the world conference that America should continue to rule in the Philippines. The United States brought great good to his native land, the chief said, and there was opportunity for much additional work.

The United States has gained the confidence of the Moros to a great extent, Cuadara added, and while the civilization of Christianity has not spread to all the people, it is only a question of time until that will have been accomplished.

Miss Avelina Lorenzano of Manila, dressed in black robes and with long hair reaching to her waist, endorsed the plea of Cuadara. A native of the islands, she said that the United States had emancipated the Filipino women.

Royalty Upset by Thrilling Chase Through London

LONDON, July 12, (UP)—A thrilling police chase after a murder suspect caused a sensation in the exclusive Brook street residence district tonight and startled guests leaving the residence of Lord and Lady Mountbatten. King Alfonso of Spain and the Duchess of York were among the guests.

Screams of "murder" followed by five pistol shots caused a near-panic among the society leaders and members of royalty leaving the reception. The screams continued from a house opposite the residence of Lord Mountbatten and apparently the voice was that of a woman.

Immediately policemen dashed through the crowd of Mayfair residents leaving the reception and dances at homes nearby. They chased the suspect, who attempted to escape over the roofs of buildings and was seen to fall through a skylight.

He extricated himself, however, and the chase continued through gardens, over walls and around the fashionable Brook street homes. The police lost sight of the man but later arrested two suspects after searching roofs in the surrounding area with lanterns.

It was stated that after a prolonged struggle, Major Cooper, secured by a rope which was held by a companion, opened the door sufficiently to climb onto the step of the machine, but it was declared that it had been generally decided it would be impossible to fall out accidentally.

Ice Breaker Saves One Group, Sights Another On Floes

Believed Second Party One Which Set Out To Find Italia's Stranded Force With Dog Teams; Malmgren, Swedish Physicist, Dead

LONDON, July 12, (UP)—The daring attempts of brave men of the north to rescue their comrades in distress apparently have been highly successful during the past 24 hours and six lives given up as lost have been saved, with the chances excellent that others will yet be rescued.

Dispatches received here tonight from Virgo Bay and from Rome indicated that four members of the Italia crew who have been in desperate need of help were rescued by the Russian relief ship Krassin and that three other men—apparently members of a dog sled expedition to rescue the Italia crew—have been sighted.

This news, coupled with the news from Moscow earlier today that two Italians had been rescued after 43 days of wandering on arctic ice and the body of another had been recovered, constituted the most successful day of rescue operations since the dirigible Italia crashed May 25 after a flight over the north pole.

National Air Tour Leaves L. A. Amid Cheers of Crowd

LOS ANGELES, July 12, (UP)—With the cheers of 20,000 spectators mingling with the roar of motors, 22 planes of the national air tour and a large number of other craft landed here today.

The planes arrived from San Diego and the first landed at 2 p. m.

Robert Canwell, piloting a Lockheed monoplane, was the first to bring his craft down at Mines field. He had flown the 150 miles from San Diego in 53 minutes, 54 seconds.

As he landed all other planes of the flight were in sight from the field and came down shortly afterward.

More than 100 other planes escorted the craft to Los Angeles from San Diego.

The birdmen were greeted at the field by Mayor George Cryer.

A service station operator near Downey reported to officials that he had seen a girl who answered the description of the murder victim in an automobile with two Japanese men and that they had discussed affairs in Oakland.

The body of the girl with a bullet wound in the head was thrown from an automobile.
