SPEZIA, Italy, July 12.—A world depth record was claimed today for the submarine Humayta, built for the Brazilian navy, which reached the bottom of the sea off Tinto Islands—a depth of 3444 feet, with a bow depth of 257.52. The Humayta has a displacement of 1,400 tons and a surface speed of 18.5 knots. Her underwater speed is 10 knots.

BERLIN, July 12.—Sixty-six socialist and communist political prisoners went on hunger strike today as a protest against the inadequacy of the government's political amnesty measure, which the reichstag's legal committee approved Wednesday. The prisoners, five of them ultra nationalists, are confined in the fortresses of Sonnenburg and Gollnow.

CAVOUR, Italy, July 12.—Former Premier Giolitti, who is seriously ill here, was somewhat improved today but his troubles from heart disease and diabetes were complicated by discovery he had a tapeworm.

MEXICO CITY, July 12.—Fourteen rebels were killed and 19 wounded by citizens who repulsed an attack on the town of Anahuajillo, according to a dispatch received today by the newspaper Excelsior. The defenders lost three dead and one wounded. Two rebels were killed and several wounded in two other encounters.

BELGRADE, July 12.—Six persons were killed and a number injured in a political riot at Pietrich over the assassination of General Protogoroff, Macedonian leader, according to dispatches from the Balkarian frontier. Protogoroff was killed by a member of the Macedonian revolutionary committee.

TURIN, Italy, July 12.—Four persons are known to have been killed and 49 workmen buried in debris when two floors of a moving picture house in course of construction at Cuneo crashed today. The queen, who is spending the summer at Santana Valdiere, visited the injured. She embraced and kissed the mother of one of the men who died and directed that the woman be taken home in the royal automobile.

Klamath Phone Firm Bought by Coast Company

Sale of the Klamath Telephone and Telegraph company, the Klamath Telephone and Telegraph company of Lake county, and the Butte Valley Telephone company of northern California, to the West Coast Telephone company, was formally announced yesterday. Transfer of the properties has been affected. The three, Klamath, Lake and Elskiyva telephone concerns were jointly controlled by J. H. Hessig and Joseph Hessig. Between the three concerns, they serve practically all the territory in the Klamath basin outside of Klamath Falls.

Rumors of the contemplated sale have been current for months. The deal was finally brought to a virtual close in the office of McCulloch, Manning and Oriscoll, Klamath legal firm.

The West Coast Telephone company is a merger of practically all the major independent telephone companies in Oregon and Washington. It is strongly financed. To undertake the combine the sum of five and one half million dollars was raised through the Pierce, Fair and company, financial house, Portland.

W. N. Winter is president of the new concern. He was formerly president and chief owner of the independent telephone company of Everett, Wash., a city of 40,000. Charles Hall, Marshfield, is chairman of the board of directors. He was formerly the chief owner of the Coos, and Curry county telephone company which serves Coos, Curry counties of Oregon, and Del Norte county of California, and also the Oregon Telephone company which served Yamhill and Washington counties of this state.

The Klamath basin concerns were sold for several hundred thousand dollars. It is understood. Exact consideration was not announced.

The Bell Telephone company has 25 per cent of the common stock of the new concern and seats three of its officials on the board of directors.

According to officials of the Western Telephone company immediate plans for development and expansion will be laid and approximately the same amount expended for the purchase of the companies will be invested in strengthening the three systems by improvements and extensions.

Toulouse Trial Set for Today

Trial of Earl Toulouse, charged with larceny, will open Friday morning in circuit court before Judge A. L. Leavitt, it was announced today by the district attorney's office.

Toulouse was indicted by the grand jury on the accusation of having stolen an electric range. A jury which tried Ray Eaton on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, could not reach an agreement and was discharged by the court for want of an agreement. It is the second "hung" jury in the past ten days.

Burglars Enter Blacksmith Shop

Gaining entrance through a rear window by the use of a step ladder, robbers entered the O. K. Blacksmith Shop at 429 South Sixth street during Wednesday night, broke open the safe and got away with \$60 in silver.

In the rush to leave the building the robbers failed to notice \$200 in currency which had fallen from the safe and this morning when the robbery was discovered the currency was found within a few feet of the safe.

That the robbery was committed by experienced hands is the opinion of the police. Gloves were used to break the safe open, so that finger prints could furnish no clue.

Entrance to the safe was gained by punching holes through the combination which fell apart. Two money bags, one of canvas and another of tan leather were used by the robbers to carry the silver in. Both bags have the First National Bank stamp on them.

At a late hour this afternoon no clues to the robbery had been given out by the police department.

PLEADS GUILTY

CHICAGO, July 12. (UP)—George W. Anderson, bank teller, who squandered a fortune at European gaming tables, pleaded guilty in federal court to a charge of embezzling \$97,000 from the Calumet National bank. The hearing was continued until next Tuesday, when the case will be taken before a federal grand jury.

NAVYSEAPLANE BREAKS RECORD

PHILADELPHIA, July 12. (UP)—Six new world's records for seaplanes were established today by the navy craft, PN-12, No. 2, sister ship of the PN-12 which recently was wrecked.

Piloted by Lieut. A. W. Corton, accompanied by Chief Boatswain E. K. Rieber, the PN-12 set new marks for endurance—two for range and three for speed.

The records were: Endurance record of 16 hours, 29 minutes, and 51 2-5 seconds for planes carrying a "pay" load of 2,000 kilograms (about two tons.)

Speed record averaging 85 miles an hour for 2,000 kilogram load, 1,000 kilogram load and 500 kilogram load.

Range records for 2,000 and 1,000 kilograms and for the distance of 2,150 kilometers (about 1,350 miles.)

The plane followed a course from the hangar to a pier at Claymont, Del., making 43 consecutive trips.
