Home Decorations

Query. How can one tell an Oriental rug?

Answer. First of all, deal with a merchant whose word you can trust. There are good books in our local library on Oriental weaving. Experience and constant study are the only roads which lead to a knowledge of these things.

Query. Is the front porch one of the things which is becoming a thing of the past. So many of the newer houses seem to be built without a front porch.

Answer. Yes, the front porch is passing, and instead an interesting artistic entrance is being planned. The loggia and the Spanish patio are far more friendly and quickly become the center of the home life, while forming the connecting link between the house and the garden. Screened living rooms at one side of the house and partly hidden from the street are popular, too.

Query. How should draperies for an oval window be hung?

Answer. This is always an interesting but difficult problem. For the window is made or spoiled by the one who arranges fixtures. A fitted balance board to which the draperies are attached is usually the most satisfactory. Straight poles should never be used.

Query. Is wrought iron satisfactory and good at present?

Answer. Wrought iron is very good indeed and quite in keeping with the modern early American furniture. Select simple things with good lines and proportions, and you will never regret your investment.

Query. What is an antique and what determines its value?

Answer. An antique is generally supposed to be at least 100 years old, and its value is determined in various ways. The location of the market, the demand which fashion has placed, and the scarcity of the article, are all important factors. Workmanship, materials and condition of the article all enter into an estimate of value. There are so many clever imitations of almost everything on the market today that it takes an expert to tell the genuine from the modern imitation.

Query. What is the difference between a hooked rug and a punched rug?

Answer. The hooked rug is made as our grandmothers made them, with some kind of a rug hook and the yarn or strips of cloth pulled through from the under side. The punched rug is a very modern affair and is done with a punch needle into which the yarn is threaded. Cloth is not practical for these rugs, since the needle would have to be threaded too often. These rugs are being advertised and encouraged by yarn manufacturers but they lack the atmosphere which is so really found in the rugs of our grandmothers' day.

Books of Today

The Reader in the Dark

With the advent of the silly season the publishers of detective fiction are working overtime. There is something about the combination of a mystery story and a haumock shaded from the summer sun that is irresistible to the reading public. One of the best of the new crop is "The Man in the Dark" by John Ferguson (Dodd, Mead and Company).

The title is almost inevitable for the hero is puzzled by developments, lost in a London midnight fog, and blind from a war injury. Strange things happen to Sandy Kinloch in that Ealing house where murder was committed before his sightless eyes and the solution, although not startling, is well and fairly worked out.

A Crazy Countess

A well-meaning young American who thinks he is destined to write a novel and a fantastic Russian countess are the main characters in Wood Kahler's amusing first novel, "Early to Bed" (Knopf).

Alden goes to Paris with the firm intention of leading a sane and exemplary life for a year, during which time he will produce a worthwhile novel. He might have done so if he had not met Oshiga Karpovna and become entangled with her miscellaneous collection of Bohemian hangings-on. At the end of the novel, when Alden returns to America, the reader feels that he has not missed his year. Oshiga may have been eccentric, but she was never dull.

Although there is much that is reminiscent of Ernest Hemingway in these pages, the work is by no means merely imitative. Kahler, with some few exceptions, writes like a veteran, with a deft and occasionally witty style. Some of the characterizations are excellent, especially those of Tuto, the artist, and Madame de Poutette, Alden's mentor.
