CRILLEY KO'S DICK REED IN SECOND ROUND

Frisco Leather Pusher Proves Too Experienced for Husky Klamath Lad—Semi-Final Goes to Draw—Special Event Over Quickly.

Jack Crilley of San Francisco lived up to advance notices by knocking out Dick Reed in the second round of a scheduled ten-round bout last night at the Vets' pavilion. Crilley was clearly the more experienced fighter and went about his business without delay.

Reed, the Klamath favorite, lacked the experience necessary to cope with his hard-socking opponent. This boy Crilley can hit and proved it by the manner in which he applied his right to Reed's chin. Reed made two trips to the canvas preceding the knockout.

In the semi-final, Pat McFadden, local boy, and Cliff Hottinger of San Francisco fought to a draw in six rounds at 150 pounds. It was a slam-bang battle and both boys were trying hard to put over a finishing punch. This scrap was a nice one and local fans would like to see a return bout.

The special event lasted quick with Ted Tanner of Klamath Falls knocking out Chick Kennedy of Medford in the second round. Tanner was the smarter boxer and Chick plainly showed lack of condition.

The second bout between Willie Musgrove, the hard-hitting boy from Donart's Pool hall, and Rudy Sama, Chiloquin fighter, was a good draw. Sama got a Chicago count in the final round when Willie failed to retire to a neutral corner, following a knockdown.

In the opener, Lee Swope and Norman Neathammer fought a slashing four-round bout, with Swope getting the decision. This was a return match and the boys again proved a crowd pleaser.

The entire card was excellent and is due largely to the efforts of Joe Bickelstaff, energetic promoter. There was a nice crowd in attendance and the fans were well pleased with the bout.

Joe Gorman of Grants Pass and Game Grady of Ashland were introduced and received a nice hand.

Yankee Athletes to Stage Track Meet at Cologne

Aboard S. S. President Roosevelt, July 19. (UP)—The American Olympic committee today accepted an invitation to send an American track and field team to Cologne August 11 and 12 in connection with the International Press conference to be held there. The athletes who will compete at Cologne will be the group of stars not included in the team chosen to compete in the Stamford Bridge, England, meet on August 11.

Many other invitations to athletic meets scheduled after the Olympics at Amsterdam have been sent to the committee and tentative plans have been made to permit members of the American team to compete.

The meet at Stamford Bridge will pit the best of the United States talent against England's stars, and probably will be outstanding in post-Olympic competition.

An invitation to send a track and field team to the Racing club meet in Paris August 11 and 12 also has been tentatively accepted and part of the men who compete at Cologne probably will enter the Paris contests if the invitation is definitely accepted.

Invitations from Budapest, Oslo, Bergen and Stockholm, where meets are planned, are under consideration, the committee said. The members of the swimming team have been invited by the Hells Swimming club of Magdeburg, Germany, to make a four-week tour through Germany, Austria and Hungary. They also have been asked to compete at Torquay, Utrecht, Braford, Yorkshire, Gladbeck, Westphalia and Oslo.

Tom Heeney Not Worrying Over Big Row With Tunney

FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 19. (UP)—A fight is a fight to Tom Heeney. The challenger for the heavyweight title is no more worked up over his battle with Gene Tunney a week from tonight at the Yankee stadium than he was over his first bout in this country with Charlie Anderson, Chicago negro, in February, 1927.

"We both have two fists," Heeney said today, "and I figure I can use mine as well as Tunney can his." Except that I am making more money for this fight, I would just as soon fight anybody else. I'm not thinking about fighting Tunney or a champion, I'm just going in there to fight another man."

All reports to the contrary, Heeney is training for his big chance just as he trained for Paulino, Delaney, Risko, Sharkey and all the others. He has not changed his style as reported, and in today's workout demonstrated that he will go after Tunney with head down and fists flying.

James J. Corbett, former heavyweight champion, was in Heeney in action for the first time today, and was impressed with the challenger's ruggedness. "Heeney is a second edition of Tom Sharkey," Corbett said. "He does not hit as hard as Sharkey did, but he hits oftener."

Tom Sharkey was one of the greatest heavyweights of all time, and fought John L. Sullivan to a standstill in a 25-round bout at Coney Island, only to lose the decision.

If the Tunney-Heeney fight goes the limit, Corbett believes the challenger has a great chance to win.

"If Tunney doesn't stop Heeney inside of eight rounds, Heeney will improve during the last part of the fight and those last seven rounds may be the toughest Tunney ever had."

Corbett came here from Speculator, N. Y., where he watched the champion in training. Corbett will be 62 years old in September and won the title from Sullivan seven years before Heeney was born.

Among the others who watched Heeney in training today were Jack Kearns, former manager of Jack Dempsey; Mickey Walker, middleweight champion; Louis (Kid) Kaplan, former featherweight champion; Rene De Vos, Belgian contender for the middleweight title; Dan Morgan, former manager of Paul Herinbach, and Bert Lyell, motion picture actor.

Kearns believes Heeney can win the title by keeping Tunney on the defensive.

"Heeney will stand a much better chance of winning, if the third man in the ring makes the champion break clean," Kearns said. "Tunney had Dempsey tied up at close quarters in both their bouts."

Charlie Harvey, Heeney's manager, will go before the commission Tuesday and demand that the referee for the bout be instructed to make both fighters break cleanly.

Mickey Walker was to have sparred with Heeney today, but Harvey deemed it would do the challenger no good at this late stage of training, and Heeney went through his usual workout.

He was up at 5 a. m., went three miles on the road and played a round of golf. About 4 p. m. he went through his gym workout, skipping the rope, punching the light bag and shadow boxing for one round each and then boxing two rounds each with James J. Braddock, Jersey City light heavyweight, and James J. Lawless, Elizabeth, N. J., heavyweight.

Johnny Hennessy also radiated confidence, and predicted Francis Hunter would win from Baron Henri de Mompurgo, the Italian ranking player.

"De Mompurgo is considerably overrated," Hennessy said, "and Hunter not only is faster, but he hits a harder ball. Hunter will prove a great credit to American tennis in the next 24 hours."

Hollywood, Sacto Zoom to Higher Levels in League

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19. (UP)—The Pacific Coast League's skyrockets, Hollywood and Sacramento, kept zooming to higher levels today with victories.

Hollywood maintained its two-game advantage over the Senators by their third straight victory over the San Francisco Seals, 4 to 2. The Senators increased their lead over the Los Angeles Angels to three and one-half games.

The Hollywood and Seal game was a tight affair with both teams making six hits. Neither team managed to score more than one run in any one inning. Seattle slumped further down the scale in the percentage list by receiving a 13 to 2 drubbing from the Sacramento Senators. The seventh proved to be the best inning for the Senators. They made five runs in that period.

Taking a substantial lead in the second inning by scoring six runs and adding five more in the fifth as well as scoring once in the sixth and seventh innings, the San Francisco Missions took a 13 to 4 victory from the Angels. The Missions made 21 hits.

Oakland maintained its tie with the San Francisco Missions by defeating the Portland Beavers, 7 to 2. Both teams turned in 10 hits, but the five runs brought in by the Oaks during the latter part of the contest won the game for them.
