Men Drafted to Fight Big Fire

The main buildings and 20 small cottages of the old Homestead ranch were destroyed shortly after an explosion of a cook stove in one of the buildings had started the fire.

The ranch was more than 50 years old and in recent years had been used as a public resort. Between 75 and 100 guests were reported to have lost all their belongings.

Edmond Cook, 21, rancher, was injured by a burning timber that fell from one of the buildings, and a woman and 10-year-old boy had to be carried from one of the cottages.

An old grandfather's clock and enlarged photographs of founders of the ranch were saved by Arthur McCray, owner, but he nearly lost his life. The roof of the ranch's headquarters collapsed just after he emerged from the structure.

Flames spread through brush into secondary timber and licked their way to the outskirts of Mrs. Jennie Barnes' ranch, two miles away, where the fire fighters were concentrating their efforts. Beyond Mrs. Barnes' property there is a heavy stand of timber on drug ground.

To Main Street Property Owners:

KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, JULY 19, 1928.

Now that every feature of industrial life which Klamath Falls has ever hoped for appears on the horizon—now that railroads in every direction are being constructed—now that this city's future is assured, permit me to once more call attention to the great need of widening Main street from Eighth street to Esplanade street.

I desire to appeal to the property owners along these four blocks in the name of modern city construction, and ask that ten feet on each side of Main street be allotted to the public and the municipality, in order that Klamath Falls will swerve away from a congested district in the future that will be very difficult to handle.

As property now stands in this zone mentioned Mr. Percy Evans, Mr. George Grizzle and myself will be the heaviest temporary losers, for each of us has modern buildings which we will have to cut back in order to allow this improvement. We are willing and pleased to do this; we feel we owe something to the municipality and to the general public, and if we at this time can foster an improvement that will be of priceless value to the city as a whole and to the general public, we are glad to do so. In the long run no property owner will lose, regardless of the present cost, for the values will be greatly increased with a widened street. To the men who own vacant property and to those who have not yet constructed permanent buildings it would seem the opportunity offered would be grasped quickly, but I regret to say this feature is not developing as it should.

I want to go on record now and for all future time as one who has the welfare of this city at heart, and one who appreciates the community that permits me to prosper; and I therefore renew my offer to give ten feet off my property and cut back the Arcade hotel at my own expense, if we can have a widened street from Eighth to Esplanade street, and also ten feet from 125 feet I own on Main and Twelfth streets.
